THE SUMMER TOURIST.—Mr. A. S. Johnson informs us that already this season a number of tourists have applied at his Information Bureau for particulars regarding the summer hotels of the Province, etc. Many of these have been able to get accommodation. Others not finding just what they wanted here, after a trial, have gone elsewhere. The majority of the applicants seem to want accommodations and all the attractions of a first class hotel, while many desire a quiet holiday in some suitable farm house, though they expect somewhat better fare and attention than ordinary farm houses can provide. These are the requirements, for which the tourists are quite willing to pay a good price. If they can be furnished with what they desire it is probable that very many more would spend their summer on the Island.

STRAWBERRY SHIPMENT.—Mr. Cook, the purser of the S. S. Halifax, brought with him from Boston this trip a number of patent zinc refrigerator cases, in which he is taking to Boston about two thousand boxes of strawberries. The cases are lined inside and out with zinc and are divided into sections, each just large enough to hold one box. Mr. Boyer supplied the berries which he had fresh picked this morning. It is to be hoped that the refrigerator cases will prove a success and if the berries can be put upon the Boston market in a good condition at this time of the year the financial part of the venture is more than assured. Strawberries are one of the things of which people never seem to become tired and Prince Edward Island should grow many times more than it now does. Farmers and gardeners should look out and get a large number of plants set out this fall and next spring.
