Forest Fire Fighting Outlined At Alberton

ALBERTON — General fire fighting techniques with particular reference to forest fires was the subject of an address by provincial forester, Frank Gaudet to the Alberton fire department Thursday night.

Mr. Gaudet expressed appreciation to Alberton firemen for excellent work during the forest fires in their area in 1960 and also said he was pleased to have them take charge of a department of industry fire fighting truck that will be stationed in Alberton next spring for forest fire protection duties.

The truck is a 1960 Fargo with four-wheel drive, carries 1,200 gallons of water, a power take-off operated pump and an auxiliary pumper with several thousand feet of hose.

Equipment carried on the truck, requirements for the crew and other details were outlined by the speaker who was extended a hearty vote of thanks for attending the meeting. A film on fighting fires with portable pumps and hoses was shown by Mr. Gaudet.

Alberton Revenue For 1961 Declines By \$1,000 Over '60

ALBERTON — The annual statement of revenue and expenditure for the Town of Alberton has been received from the auditor, Harvey R. Hutt, and shows a total revenue in 1961 of \$18,777.50, approximately \$1,000 less than the previous year.

Revenue during the year included current taxes, \$6,419.24; arrears \$869.78; fines \$1,024.72;

provincial grant \$7,390; fire protection tax and fire department income \$1,067. Included among the expenditures were policeman's salary, \$2,826.52; fire protection \$431.14; electricity \$1,249.31; maintenance to streets and sidewalks \$2,186.35; sanitation \$2,244.23; relief \$830.

Included in the fixed assets column were the fire hall and equipment \$6,300; and sewer installation \$197,605.96, while listed as current assets were cash on hand and in the bank \$4,002.15; loans receivable, Alberton Curling Club \$2,696; taxes receivable, \$3,879.35; sewer, cash on hand and in the bank, \$2,392.96; installation accounts receivable \$3,307.65; sinking fund \$13,173.66.

Among items listed as liabilities were provincial government loan, fire truck \$1,250; Alberton Curling Club \$2,696; Canadian Bank of Commerce loan \$24,000; Town of Alberton bonds \$75,000; accounts payable \$7,952.47 and investment in capital assets, \$32,733.40.

Roof Blaze Extinguished In S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Only quick action on the part of the Summerside fire department late yesterday afternoon saved the three-storey wooden warehouse on Water Street West, known as Joe Reid's and Company, from serious damage.

Firemen quickly climbed to the roof and extinguished the flames as they ate a small hole in the shingles beside the flue. Damage was estimated at about \$50.

Occupants in apartments on the upper stories were not aware of the fire until firemen knocked off their doors while trying to locate it from the inside.

All four units of the department arrived at the scene shortly after the alarm was sent in at 5:30 by some person in an adjoining building and within minutes the fire was completely under control.

The building is located on the north side of Water Street just east of the railway crossing.

Mr. Dow said the principal feature on the daily menu will be a wide variety of charcoal grilled steaks, believed to be a new feature of the culinary art in Charlottetown.

Other features will be a varied selection of exotic Lebanese

dishes, most of which have never before been offered to the public in this city, and which Mr. Dow believes will prove to be very palatable to his clientele.

The new restaurant, will operate on extended hours, opening daily at 8 a.m. and closing each morning at 2 a.m. On opening day, new customers will be provided with a special treat, between midmorning and 3 p.m. when customers will be hosted by Mr. Dow who will invite them to examine the new establishment and also serve free coffee and doughnuts.

Attractively decorated, with gleaming fixtures, equipment and utensils, the new restaurant will provide accommodation for 60 diners, at tables, at the counter and in booths.

To serve the public, Mr. Dow will employ a staff of seven, and the chef will be Fred Gau-

det of Summerside, a man with extensive experience in catering to the appetites of the waiting public.

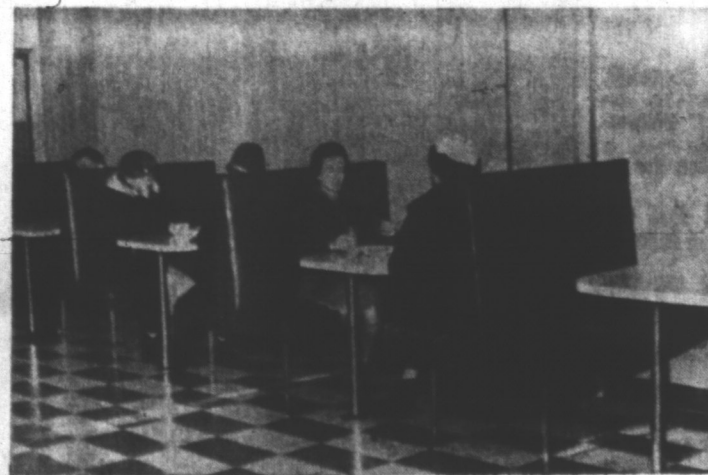
