Local and Other Items.

LOSERS BY THE SYSTEM.—It is said that the loss of \$100,000 was caused by the loss of hundreds of dollars by the lobster fishermen throughout Cape Breton.

FOURTEEN KEPT SPEAK.—Hon. Geo. E. Foster has been asked by the Canadian Club of New York to deliver the Queen's birthday address before the society on the evening of May 24th.

FLOOD FEARED.—Fear is once more expressed that British Columbia will suffer from floods this year. Ranchers are becoming anxious and talk apprehensively.

THE DEWEY CELEBRATION.—The New York aidermen have passed a resolution providing for the issue of \$150,000 to pay the expenses in connection with the proposed celebration on the arrival of Admiral Dewey.

MONTREAL'S CHEESE REPORT.—Exports of cheese from Montreal since May 1st have been 24,351 packages, compared with 13,953 for the like period last year. Or butter the export figures for the two periods are 7,757 and 2,789 packages respectively.

KILLED BY CORSETS.—Tight lacing is thought to have caused the death of Charles F. Stewart, banker and amateur actor, and one of the leading men socially in Passaic, N. J. He was found dead in bed early one morning last week, and the use of corsets, made necessary by his female part in a burlesque in which he had participated, it is supposed, brought on an attack of apoplexy.

RELIEF FOR SETTLERS.—The Ontario Government has passed an order in council authorizing an expenditure of \$300 in the purchase of seed grain and potatoes for the relief of certain settlers at Kennebec, in the northern end of the county of Frontenac. The families for whom the relief is intended number about eighty, and they are in a deplorable state of destitution owing to the destruction of their crops by frost and to an epidemic of infectious diseases having appeared among them.

PRINCIPAL TRADE MEN.—It has long been a law of the Hohenzollern family that all its princes should be taught some trade and the eldest sons of the German Emperor are now being taught the trade of a printer. Ever since the time of Frederick William it has been customary to teach his descendants the practical virtues of thrift, industry and self reliance, and for this purpose nothing is thought better than the private exercises of some handicraft. The present emperor was made no exception to this family rule, while his father was quite an expert in bookbinding.

FRUIT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION.—The official report of the Provincial Fruit Growers' Association for the past year has just been issued. It contains an account of the proceedings of the last annual meeting, and the various papers read thereat. The constitution and by-laws of the Association are also published, together with a list of the officers for 1899. The frontispiece is an excellent likeness of His Honor Lieutenant Governor Howland, who has done much towards the promotion of horticulture in this Province. The publication is a valuable one, and should be in the hands of every person interested in fruit-growing.

INFORMATION FOR TOURISTS.—Messrs. Johnson & Johnson intend to establish a Tourist Information Bureau at their downtown store in the Prowse Block. Reform in the Transvaal

PRETORIA, May 18.—President Kruger's reform proposals have been presented to the Rand. They suggest that the franchise be conferred on at least five years after eligibility to the second Rand instead of ten years after such eligibility, as is now the case, thus making a nine year's residence in the Transvaal qualify for the full franchise.

CONFESSION TO POISONING.—At Cincinnati on Thursday, James Weaver, aged 11 years, confessed to having poisoned his father, Woodson Weaver, and his half brother, John Weaver, on Tuesday last. John Weaver died in a few hours, and Woodson Weaver, though still alive, has but a slight chance for recovery. The boy said he found a box of rough on rats on the stove on Monday night and did not know what it was. He put it in the coffee pot. The police now believe the boy is responsible for the death of Woodson Weaver's second wife and for the burning of the house a few months ago. The boy's mother, Rachel Washington, has been arrested, charged with having instigated the poisoning.
