Mrs. M. J. Doyle, president, Mrs. Lorne Wylie the new convener of health and welfare was introduced and welcomed to the meeting. The minutes of the last executive meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Laughlin.

The Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada, which Ministers to the religious needs of about 36,000 of Canadian Indian population, has announced the appointment of Rev. Jack MacLeod as Indian Missionary to Port Simpson, British Columbia, a native community of about 1200 souls. He will also serve the Indian coastal communities at Alice Arm, Stewart, Forbit Mines and Skenna Canneries by boat and plane.

Mr. MacLeod, who was born at Valleyfield West, P. E. I., and who has, for the past two and a half years, been Minister at Saint Peter's, N. S., will leave for his new work early in October.

"Today is operational day at the new Montague federal building when for the first time mail will be distributed through its wicket. Moving day took place on Saturday, and over the weekend everything was placed in readiness for opening business this morning. For the convenience of the public, mail boxes have been placed in the outer lobby to which they will have access after the inner lobby is closed in the evening.

The 123rd anniversary services in Alberton United Church yesterday were conducted by the minister, Rev. Murray Gardner who also read a brief historical sketch of the congregation.

Rev. W. S. Godfrey, D. D. superintendent of home missions for the Maritime Conference and a former Minister of the public, the morning, was guest preacher in the morning. Choosing as his text, "He Shall Have Dominion from Sea to Sea" (Ps. 72:8) Rev. Dr. Godfrey said that if Canada is to become a Christian nation she must be christianized by the church.

## TUESDAY

Ellis Enman, 26, an employee of Curran & Briggs Ltd., died in Prince County Hospital early last evening, apparently from internal injuries received in a highway accident which occurred at approximately 8 p.m. about one mile west of Richmond.

The Provincial Government's extensive rural electrification programme will take a big leap forward today when Premier A. W. Matheson throws the switch at the Maritime Electric Company Limited's newly constructed sub-station at Kensington, energizing 12.8 miles of line which will serve 54 customers in the Norboro-Clinton-New London areas.

Premier A. W. Matheson, accompanied by a delegation of Government officials and others associated with the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, leaves this morning at 7:30 by Special Chartered D.C. 3 of the M.C.A. for Halifax to attend a meeting of the organization called for today. Others making the flight are Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, and Mrs. Cullen, P. A. Murnaghan, Deputy Minister, and Mrs. Murnaghan, S. C. Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Curtis, Mr. Alan Holman and Ed. M. Gorman, Director of Fisheries. Mr. C. F. Burke, who is also a member of the Economic Council left for Halifax yesterday and will also be in attendance.

Group Captain W. H. Swetman, commanding officer R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, announced today that new construction and repairs to existing facilities would total approximately \$400,000 during the next eighteen months. Group Captain Swetman's statement confirms the announcement by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., which appeared in The Guardian of July 13 last. Resurfacing and repairs of

runways will account for a third of the outlay, while new construction will include fuel storage tanks, runway approach lighting, storage facilities for high explosives and a water tank to be used for the testing of aircraft emergency dinghies.

At the annual meeting of the Progressive Conservative Association, Third District of Prince, held last night in the Town Hall, Summerside, the following officers were elected for the coming year: Chairman, Peter Gallant, Egmont Bay (re-elected); vice chairman, Gerald Glover, Spring Valley; secretary, Angus MacLellan, Cross River; James Hickey of Darnley and Tillman B. Gallant, Wellington, were appointed representatives from the Third District to act on the East Prince Association, the first names to be also on the provincial association.

## WEDNESDAY

Earl Taylor, president of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. was named a vice-president of a newly-formed Maritime Area Y. M. C. A. at the Maritime Laymen's Conference at Moncton, P.E.I. The purpose of the new grouping will be to serve as an area-wide advisory committee related to the National Council of Y. M. C. A.'s of Canada.

Dr. J. A. Clark, past district governor of Rotary and former superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, was guest speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club yesterday at Howard's Restaurant.

## THURSDAY

Contract for the new Federal building in Charlottetown has been let to Anglin-Norcross (Maritime) Ltd. It was announced last night by Mr. Neil Matheson, M.P. He made the statement at a meeting of the Fifth District Liberal Association executive, presided over by Mr. Alex McIsaac.

A resolution supporting the proposed pool system marketing policy of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board was defeated by a large majority at a meeting of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture held last night at the Charlottetown Forum. Well over 5,000 people were in attendance at the meeting which at times was marred by a small band of hecklers who would not give some of the speakers a hearing. Mr. Roland MacDonald, President of the Federation of Agriculture presided.

Prince Edward Island's percentage of Grade A hogs shows the high percentage of 57.7 for the month of August as compared to 28.0 for the whole of Canada. The province of Alberta shows a low of 17.1 for the month.

The only provinces giving the I-land any serious competition were New Brunswick and Nova Scotia with 46.1% and 45.8% respectively.

Mr. T. A. Campbell, the Provincial Fire Marshal, has announced that the fire losses throughout the Province were considerably lower in 1953 than in 1952. Losses in 1952 amounted to \$475,264.50. In 1953 the loss was \$231,616.00, a decrease of \$243,648.50. Two persons lost their lives from fire in 1953.

In a recent competition in which grocery stores throughout the Maritimes competed, The Co-op Super Market, Ellis Bros. and Shama's Grocery were equal winners. They were the only stores in the Maritimes to win top honours in the Nestle (Canada) Limited Nestle cafe display. The competition not only included window dressing but general ideas on the best methods of merchandising.

Mr. George V. Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, recently returned from Windsor, Ont. where he attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Tourist Association.

Last night he said he had made arrangements to have the 1956 convention of the organization held in Charlottetown. The vote for the location was unanimous.

Antoine Arsenault, aged 77 years, was burned to death yesterday morning at Maximville, near Wellington, in a fire which completely destroyed the house in which he was living with his daughter, Lydia, aged 51 years.

Little change is foreseen in the present number of personnel or type of operation at R.C.A.F. Station Summerside if present policy is continued by navy and air force planners, according to senior spokesmen for these two services who met on Tuesday and Wednesday with Prince Edward Island press and radio representatives who were making a two day tour of naval and air force defence and training establishments in Nova Scotia.

Linemen of the Summerside Electric Light Department have been engaged for some weeks past connecting up the residents' homes on a new power line extending from Haggerty's Corner, through Indian River, Hamlin, Malpeque and Darnley, a distance of about 20 miles. Authorization to have this line installed was granted and the work authorized by the council in June.
