One evening there will be about four miles of little lanterns sent floating down the great river in honor of the dead. Or there will be the baking of the glutinous rice cakes, accompanied by many curious ceremonials. And in it all the child takes his part, and his elders are very kind to him and never bother him with cleaning up or putting on clothes to go out. He strips to the waist or beyond it in summer; then, as the winter comes on, puts on even another and another garment till he becomes as broad as he is long.

At nighttime perhaps he takes off some clothes, but they are all the same shape, all quite loose and easy. Then he never need be afraid of breaking anything or spoiling anything, for most things are put away, and Chinese things are not like European. The shining black table, for instance, can have a hot kettle stood upon it and be none the worse.

No one ever tells the Chinese child to hold himself up or not to talk so loud or to keep still, so he shouts and wriggles to his heart's content. And European children grow like him in this respect, and when readmitted to European houses their feet are forever rubbing about and their hands fiddling with something which spoils, as European things will spoil.—Mrs. Little's "Intimate China."

**Death of Mr. John Cantwell.**

The quiet village of Souris West, was thrown into consternation on Friday evening, the 13th inst., when the sad news was circulated, that Mr. John Cantwell, one of the most respected residents, had suddenly and unexpectedly passed away. Mr. Cantwell had been in his usual good health up to the day of his death. He complained on that day of being a trifle distressed at his stomach, but there was no occasion for alarm. He had partaken of his evening meal with his wife and family, when complaining of not feeling well, he laid on his bed, Mrs. Cantwell hearing some faint noise in the throes of death. Medical aid was instantly sent for, and all possible means resorted to to resuscitate him but all to no avail, the messenger of death had done his work and had left one more disconsolate widow and family to mourn the loss of a kind husband and an affectionate father. The deceased was the second son of Patrick Cantwell and Catharine Price; born near Harmony in the year 1840 and was consequently in his 59th year. He married Elizabeth Conway to whom was born four sons and six daughters. Two of the sons survive him, James, who is settled in Boston, and John Thomas who has always remained at home with his father. Three daughters also are left to mourn, besides a disconsolate widow.

Mr. Cantwell was an energetic, persevering and industrious man. He had been for several years engaged as superintendent of Souris breakwater and had also been engaged in a similar work at Mabou, C. B. He was highly respected and esteemed by everybody, proof of which was shown by the very large concourse of people of all denominations who accompanied his remains to their final resting place in St. Felix's cemetery, Rollo Bay, where all that was mortal of his remains were quietly laid to rest, amidst the tears of many friends.
