Tito Ready To Visit Washington

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia said he Wednesday night he is ready to visit Washington if invited to discuss Yugoslavia's relations with the United States.

He told Western correspondents at a Kremlin reception that he thought his current three-week visit to Russia would make for better relations with the United States.

Tito was questioned by Western new paper men about the U.S. Senate resolution by Senator Joseph R. McCarthy calling for the end of

Acquitted On Charge Of Reckless Driving

"The evidence produced by the Crown does not show that the accused was driving with wanton or reckless disregard for others, and therefore I adjudge the verdict dismissed." Such was the verdict handed down yesterday morning by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at the conclusion of the preliminary hearing in the case of John A. Bell, charged with criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle.

The session opened with a lengthy discussion by both the Crown and the defence on the admissibility of a written statement which was taken from the accused by the R.C.M.P. on Sunday, May 6, at the P.E.I. Hospital. The defence offered a number of objections as to why the statement should not

be considered as evidence. Magistrate Gaudet ruled that the statement was given voluntarily and was therefore admissible as evidence at the hearing. Cst. J.W.R. MacDonald was then recalled to the stand and was asked to read the statement to the court. The defence called no witnesses. Somerled Trainor appeared for the defence and J.P. Nicholson for the Crown.

Three other cases were on the docket all charged under the Highway Traffic Act. One for operating a vehicle without a licence for three years was fined five dollars and costs or five days. Two charged with operating vehicles with defective brakes were each fined five dollars and costs or five days.

Special Gifts \$26,400 In PEI Hospital Campaign

At a meeting of the special gifts committee of the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign, held yesterday afternoon in the Game Room at the Armouries, an additional \$7,000 was reported, making the total contributions received from this group to date, \$26,400.

Mr. Harold Palmer, co-chairman of the committee, who presided at the meeting, stressed the importance of every member putting forth an extra effort in the next few days to complete this phase of the Campaign. He also pointed out that they needed to emphasize to all potential contributors the fact that the Hospital has not had a campaign for ten years, and the importance of making every effort to obtain a pledge on a three year payment plan.

He said, "It is indicated by the high ratio of cash received to date that the three year plan has not been taken seriously by some and there is an indication that the public, in general, has not grasped the magnitude of the problem confronting the Hospital and the large amount of the goal, \$250,000.00."

STRESSES THREE YEAR PLAN

Mr. J. David Stewart, general chairman of the campaign, assured the group that "By the persistent, forceful selling of the three year plan, the goal is possible of achievement and everyone in the entire community would want nothing less than a successful campaign." He said, "Unity of purpose and a real understanding of the need, everyone giving on a fair share basis according to their means, will bring about a successful and happy conclusion to this great forward movement for the better protection of the health of ourselves and our families."

He complimented the Board of Trustees of the Hospital on their excellent record of performance during the past few years and pointed out that, while the patient bed rate is one of the lowest of any Hospital in Canada, they have been able to effect a small saving in their current annual budget yearly.
