Egyptian War Notes.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 13.

VISITING THE WOUNDED.

The Duke of Connaught, to-day, visited
those wounded in last Saturday's engage-
ment. Most of these are doing well,
and will soon be fit for duty again. Some
of the worst cases will be moved on-board
ship as soon as they can bear removal so
as to avoid the heat on shore. The hospi-
tal arrangements are thoroughly well
carried out.

THE FIRST ARMY CORPS

has now left England. With the Indian
contingent en route, or about to embark,
there will soon be close upon 24,000
men in Egypt, with a reserve of 10,000
within call of Sir Garnet Wolseley. The
expense of the expedition will be great,
but not so great at the end as starving the
war would have been. The Second
Army Corps will be ready in a short
time. It is hoped their services will not
be required.

ARABI'S POSITION.

Arabi has withdrawn his men from
several points near Ramleh, which re-
quired a stronger garrison than he could
spare, his whole force is in a better po-
sition now than ever. Behind him is a
broad country with every railway facility
and the Mahmoudieh Canal at his
side to supply him with water. The nar-
row spit in front of him flanked by
Lakes Mareotis and Aboukir, is too
marshy for cavalry to operate freely
upon or for guns to be easily brought up
by it, while from his lofty position he
can sweep the whole of the approaches
with his artillery, while all the ground
about is firm enough to admit of any
movements. He is now utilizing this
and constructing, almost uninterruptedly,
a formidable redan, with a thirty feet
high embankment, within 5,000 yards of
Ramleh. The "Superb" is trying to
rake the works. She fired several shells
to day in their direction, five of which
burst in, and one just over them. Those
who were before Plevna say that Arabi
has taken a lesson from its intrenchments
with his lines so distributed as to mini-
mize the effect of artillery fire. His idea
is apparently either to compel an assault
or a siege. The former would entail
tearful loss; the latter, with all the
country open behind Arabi's work would
be Sebastopol over again, with the
added difficulties of the climate.

A Snow Storm and Frost Reported
in the West.

CHICAGO, Aug. 11.—Frosts are reported
from Northern Wisconsin, and even in the
suburbs of this city there was a light frost
Thursday morning. The cold spell has
done no damage to grain or vegetation. The
propeller "Menominee" is reported by her
captain to have encountered in the middle
of Lake Michigan, Tuesday night, a thick
cold cloud, which burst on the decks, cov-
ering them with snow and slush six inches
deep. For five minutes the atmosphere
was like that of winter, but as the steamer
was moving rapidly she soon came into a
warmer temperature.

That Cool Chicago Story.

In its present envied condition, due
to the heat, the East can stand almost any-
thing, but we nevertheless think that
Chicago was needlessly cruel a few hours
ago when she telegraphed that a vessel on
the lake had encountered such a cold storm
that its deck was hidden under six inches
of snowy slush. If there is any such
weather on Lake Michigan Chicago should
have the humanity to send a little of it
here in refrigerator cars. If she cannot do
this she can at least keep silent. Would
the beatified Lazarus have considered it
the friendly thing to shake a goblet of ice
water before the hot eyeballs of the thirsty
Dives?—New York Herald.

One of the signs of the times in the South
concerns the large number of able men who
in other days would have devoted them-
selves to politics, but who now seeks pro-
fessorships in academies. The democratic
candidate for Governor of South Carolina
preferred to remain an officer under the
educational system of the State, but was
induced to forego private for public con-
siderations.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR.—It is currently reported in
the country that the Directors of the Old
Bank of Prince Edward Island are backing
out from paying the seventy thousand
dollars which they promised to pay for
resumption in addition to their liabilities
as Shareholders. They must have con-
sidered that they were legally and morally
bound to pay that for their neglect of duty
in managing the affairs of the Bank be-
fore they consented to do so. How then
can they refuse to pay the same amount
for the liquidation of the affairs of the
Bank? The fact is, depositors and share-
holders who have been injured by these
Directors should take immediate steps to
make them pay the utmost farthing. A
great wrong has been committed, and who
is responsible for it, if not the Directors
who were paid to do their duty. Public
opinion must make these Directors feel
that they must toe the mark; and if they
have no shame or common sense, the law
should be applied to bear upon them. In
my opinion they are equally guilty with
the Directors of the Glasgow Bank; and
if neglect of duty is a legitimate cause of
action against other ordinary mortals, why
I should like to ask, should poor men be
called upon to lose their money in this
concern through the neglect and passive
indifference of the Directors of the Old
Bank. Ever since the Bank suspended
they were blowing cold and hot and back-
ing and filling. No one outside them-
selves and officials knew anything about
what they were doing. Creditors have no
means of knowing what the assets are; if
they call at the Bank information is equally
meagre there; and I presume if they call
at the court they will not find much satis-
faction there. Depositors may be offered
a certain amount; but they have no right
to take one cent less than the full amount,
because the Directors and Shareholders
reaped the emoluments and profits attached
to their Banking institution, and they have
semi annually published and declared state-
ments duly attested to which deceived the
public as to the standing of the Bank.
People were deceived, and deposited their
money in good faith. Let old Shylock and
his twenty-five per cent. come down hand-
somely now. Men who would exact the
last cent from the estate of a poor man un-
fortunate in business, should be made to
feel that they neglected their duty in look-
ing after the affairs of the Bank; and they
have no right, if my information is correct,
to back down from paying the full liability.
I hope, Mr. Editor, you will be able to
receive an explanation from these Directors
as to the management of the affairs of the
Bank. The Directors have, at least, a
right to mend up the affairs of Bank with-
out incurring expenses that are likely to re-
duce the dividend properly belonging to
the creditors of the Bank. The expenses
of the agent sent to Ottawa to secure legis-
lation, and the expenses of Mr. Davies in
England, will no doubt be heavy. Why
was not this entrusted to Mr. Brecken, and
save expenses? What right have the
Directors to shirk their duty in this mat-
ter when they neglected their duty and
allowed the Bank to go on to ruin? It
would be interesting to the creditors of
the Bank to know what they have been
doing since the 28th of last November.
How many firms did they compromise and
settle with at a less rate than one hundred
cents on the dollar?

I would suggest that depositors of small
amounts should meet and arrange about
taking proper counsel at once with a view
of ascertaining to what extent the law can
be made to bear upon the guilty institu-
tion.

It is very unfair to Shareholders that
these Directors should get clear with a
Shareholders liability. Let justice be
done though the heavens should fall.
