GUBANS KILLED. IN HAVANA.

In an Affray With Spanish Officers.

MEN ACCUSED OF A PLOT TO SEIZE THE CITY.

Wanted to Close Theatre on Account of Garcia's Death.

HAVANA, Dec 13.—Three Cubans were killed, and one Spanish officer and two Cubans wounded last night in an affray between some Spanish officers and a number of citizens and a party of Cubans who wished to close the theatre on account of the death of General Garcia the Cuban General.

The Cubans are accused of a plot to cause an uprising and seize the city at a time when the Spanish garrison is greatly weakened and before the American troops have arrived in numbers sufficient to enforce order.

LIKE A FAIRY TALE.

The Strange Story that Comes From Far Away Sicily.

A little romance that has just come from Sicily tells of the sudden transformation of a peasant into a baroness in approved fairy-tale style. There lived with a poor family in Carini a foundling, Rosina Mano, a charming girl of 15 years, who had been brought there from the orphan asylum at Palermo. Although she had lived her whole life among the peasants, working as a fruit packer, she showed by her gentle manners that she was of a superior origin to those about her. A few weeks ago Baron Avellone, a rich gentleman from Palermo, after making a thorough investigation, ascertained that the modest Rosina was the child of whom he was in search—the child of an early, secret marriage. He went to Carini and announced to Rosina that she was his daughter, and carried her away in great pomp to Palermo. There was a great commotion among the simple-minded peasantry, who, with tears in their eyes, cheered and praised the pretty child, in whose good fortune they rejoiced. Unfortunately, all the peasant girls about Palermo are dreaming now of rich noblemen who are to come and claim them and carry them away to live in magnificent palaces. Their daily work, it is said, suffers in consequence.

THE GERMAN SHIPYARDS,

Crowded With Work and New Orders

Cannot be Accepted.

The German shipyards are so crowded with work on merchantmen and warships that they cannot accept new orders. Besides the many warships of all descriptions now building for the German Government there are no less than twenty-two in course of construction for foreign countries—for Japan 1 armored cruiser, 8 torpedo boats and 1 torpedo-boat destroyer; for Russia, 3 cruisers and 4 destroyers; for Italy, 4 destroyers, and for Brazil, 1 destroyer. The Hamburg-American line has placed orders with German shipyards for ten, and because of the overcrowded state of the German works, with English shipbuilders for four passenger and freight steamers, of sizes ranging from 11,000 to 4,900 registered tons. Ten vessels of this class are in course of construction in German yards for the North German Lloyd of Bremen. That makes a total of twenty-four large vessels for two companies alone. "Our future lies on the waters," said the emperor recently, and the Germans are bound to make true this saying of their kaiser.

Hospitality.

PARIS, Dec. 12.—The United States commissioners have been almost overwhelmed with offers of dinner in England, prompted by the desire of prominent Englishmen to emphasize the Anglo-American entente, but they will remain in Paris until the day before sailing for the United States. They will make formal calls upon President Faure and high officials to thank them for official hospitality. Unofficial hospitality to the United States commissioners has been ostentatiously lacking in Paris.

THE PARIS COMMISSION.

All's Well That Ends Well.

PARIS, Dec. 12.—The United States peace commissioners rested yesterday, after the long rain of daily conferences and almost daily sessions with the Spaniards, the intensity of which they hardly realized until it was over. Warm personal friendships and mutual regard have arisen between the two commissions as the result of their extended controversy at close quarters. Today several members of both commissions exchanged calls. The American commissioners unofficially informed the Spaniards that they would be glad to have the two commissions dine together. The reply, which like the invitation, was conveyed diplomatically through a third party, was that the Spaniards would be most pleased, but feared it would be inadvisable, because it might be misconstrued at Madrid, where already much feeling existed against the Spanish commissioner.

Several members of the United States commission were included at first to publish the text of the treaty, but Senator Frye made a strong plea yesterday for the observance of courtesy towards the United States senate, and his arguments prevailed.

Further details, however, have been learned as to the wording of the treaty, which provides that Cuba is to be relinquished and that Porto Rico and the Philippines are to be ceded. The Americans are to pay for the repatriation of the Spanish troops from all the colonies.

The Spaniards are to return all prisoners held by them. They are to retain possession of all military stores and munitions of war in the Philippines, and of such ships as have been captured.

The commercial treaties between the two nations, which the war ruptured, are to be renewed at the convenience of the two nations.

The protocol makes nearly six hundred type-written pages.

Methodist Guinea Givers.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Although the subscription list to the fund of one million guineas, which the Wesleyan Methodists are desirous of raising next year, will not be formally opened until January, a fifth part of the total has already been guaranteed. Central meetings have been held in six out of thirty-four administrative districts into which Wesleyan England is divided. Three London districts guaranteed £70,000, Birmingham guaranteed £50,000, Leeds £30,000, and Manchester £40,000. Twenty eight districts have not yet been heard from.
