Georgetown Native Dies At Toronto

The death occurred at Sunnybrook Military Hospital, Toronto, Thursday morning, Feb. 12th of Kenneth Fraser in his 39th year. Death came after an illness of four weeks.

The late Mr. Fraser was born at Georgetown, son of Mr. Harry Fraser and the late Helen MacEachern. He was employed with the C.N.R. until the outbreak of World War II when he enlisted in the Canadian army where he saw active service for four years. After demobilization he returned to his former duties with the C.N.R. and was appointed station agent at Kinkora and later served at Breadalbane and Tignish.

Although having seventeen years seniority with the C.N.R. in 1951, he resigned his position and re-enlisted with the Canadian army going to Camp Borden for military training. Later he was stationed at Ottawa. Six weeks ago he was recalled to Camp Borden on draft for Korea. Becoming ill, he entered a military hospital in Toronto and later he was transferred to Sunnybrook Hospital.

Besides his sorrowing widow, nee Francis Morrisey of Tignish, and her two small children, Clarence and Catherine, he leaves to mourn his father, Harry Fraser of Georgetown; also two sisters and a brother, Mrs. William S. Martell, Georgetown; Mrs. Roland Martin, Ottawa and John, also of Ottawa.

Remains are being forwarded to Prince Edward Island for burial.

Maritime Religious Education Council

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 12—Rev. Robert E. Shaw, minister of the North Street Christian Church, Halifax, and formerly of Prince Edward Island, was elected president of the Maritime Religious Education Council at its annual meeting in the First United Baptist Church here yesterday.

Other officers elected by the Council were: Vice presidents, Winston Miles, Sydney; Mrs. Gordon MacDonald, Charlottetown, and Mrs. R. L. Gibbons, Halifax; secretary, Rev. H. S. Hartlin, Lunenburg, and treasurer, H. E. Hunt, Saint John.

The morning's session opened with a service of devotion conducted by Rev. E. R. Woodside, minister of the Bathurst United Church.

A report of the Maritime Sunday School Convention executive was given by Rev. M. A. Gibson of Chester, N.S. The convention will be held in Summerside, P.E.I. October 20 to 21. The convention will feature discussions on program, workshops and forms of interest to all workers in religious education, it was announced.

Department reports were featured of discussion last evening. A highlight of the report on the Maritime Children's Work Board given by Mrs. Gordon MacDonald of Charlottetown, secretary, was the announcement of the appointment of Mrs. Dora Sabean, of Truro, N. S., as children's work secretary. The report placed emphasis on vacation church schools and the new Christian family life program.

Dr. W. C. Machum, Kentville, chairman of the Boys' Work Board, outlined the report on that body's activities, which showed that 96 boys groups sponsored by the board were active in the Maritimes. The report also dealt with boys' conferences, boys' camps and the Maritime Tuxis and Older Boys' Parliament.

A report on leadership training was given by Whitney Dalrymple, Maring, general secretary of the MREB, and one on audio-visual aids by Rev. W. Burton Crowe.

At the opening session religious education workers from three provinces heard the retiring president pay tribute to the increasingly effective work of the council. Rev. J. D. Davison, Charlottetown, led the group in a service of devotion. Whitney Dalrymple, acting general secretary of the council, outlined the part which the council is playing in the youth and Sunday School work of Maritime churches and challenged the council to make more vital efforts in order that every opportunity for service might be used.

H. Everett Hunt, Saint John, presented the financial report and an increased budget, the largest in the history of the council, was adopted for the ensuing year. Other reports presented were "Personnel" by Major G. R. Smith, Halifax, that of the nominating committee by Rev. G. N. Hamilton, Saint John, and the report of the children's work board by its chairman, Mrs. Gordon MacDonald, Charlottetown.

During the supper hour a delightful banquet was served to the delegates by the ladies of the First Baptist Church.

Presided over by Mrs. R. G. Merrill, Kingston, N. S., the past president, the Girls' Work Board meeting heard reports on the activities of the board last year. Officers of the board for the new year were elected as follows: president, Mrs. J. R. Snodgrass, Fredericton; vice-president, Mrs. J. V. Levy, Moncton; secretary, Miss Marguerite Brehaut, Charlottetown, and treasurer, Miss Maxine Morse, Halifax, whose appointment was a re-nomination.
