Rating System Urged By Tourist Association

Members of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association yesterday voted 12-10 in favor of a grading system for tourist accommodation in the province at a semi-annual meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. Thrasher, who is in charge of the project, said that it would not go into effect before 1966.

The vote followed a talk on grading systems by Forbes Thrasher, Halifax, a former manager of the Lord Nelson Hotel who, until recently, was secretary of the Nova Scotia Inspectors Guild.

Mr. Thrasher, who has made extensive studies of such systems, told the island group that grading of accommodation seems to work for the benefit of both operator and customer.

The customer gets the type of accommodation he wants at the price he is willing to pay, and the operator gets customers he can satisfy. Then too, a grading system makes it easier for travel bureaus to advise visitors.

FIVE-STAR SYSTEM
The grading in, for example, a five-star system, is more a categorization than an actual "rating".

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Hospital Ass'n Speakers Stress Protection, Funds

The fifth annual meeting of the Hospital Association of Prince Edward Island was held yesterday at the Canadian Legion in Charlottetown. The day-long meeting began with registration at 9:30 followed by a business meeting.

The morning session was addressed by Charlottetown Fire Inspector Louis R. Ranahan who spoke on "Fire Prevention and Protection in the Hospital".

He said that fire resistant construction is desirable for all hospitals but the proper use of materials and the overall design of the buildings are of greater importance than the selection of the particular building materials to be used.

Mr. Ranahan also stressed the importance of at least two safe exits, automatic sprinkler protection, a fire alarm system, correct storage of oxygen, good housekeeping and proper maintenance of all equipment, restricted smoking areas, fire drills and the training of new staff.

LUNCHEON SPEAKER
Guest speaker at the luncheon was Michael MacDonald, executive director of the Nova Scotia Hospital Association. He spoke on "The Need for Voluntary Help in the Financing of Hospital Construction".

He said there is no question that the hospitals are receiving more money today than they ever did from the government, but the increased costs and increased demand for new services and facilities are out - stripping the increased income. He stated it is important not to forget that the government is not concerned alone with the wants, the needs of the individual hospital and the individual community.

Mr. MacDonald outlined a "Three - P. Program" to get voluntary donations. The three P's stand for Planning, Public Relations and Perseverance.

He felt the hospital board should accept as one of its responsibilities the need for continuing long-range planning for expansion, development and new construction.

He said that he sometimes feels that the hospitals, which probably have the biggest story to tell, get the least amount of publicity. To fit in with the planning program, the public relations program should also be continuing.

When it comes to perseverance, Mr. MacDonald said, it is necessary to go to individuals line after line, reminding them that the need still exists and that it can not be filled with mere promises and pledges.

He also made mention of the members of the community who are ready and willing to help in fund raising efforts such as Ladies Auxiliaries and service clubs.
