Variety Of Prices Quoted As Margarine Hits Market

A variety of prices was being quoted on margarine when it went on sale throughout the province hours after Royal assent had been given Saturday to the bill making such sales legal.

Some stores were selling it at two pounds for 59 cents, and in Montague stores were charging 49 cents for two pounds.

It is believed some stores in the city had planned to sell it at four pounds for \$1 as an admitted loss leader but agreement was apparently reached by the larger outlets to maintain a larger opening price.

A similar conflicting situation held in Summerside Saturday with various brands and various prices in the different stores. One brand was on sale in one and three-pound packages at a straight 30 cents per pound. A rival store was selling the same brand at two pounds for 57 cents. One of the large stores quoted 37 cents per pound.

No margarine was on sale in Alberton as supplies "booked a couple of weeks ago" had not arrived Saturday.

Praiseworthy Folk Group, New Elections Cap Scene

One of the most widely talked about subjects on the local night-circuit these past few weeks is the emergence of a new and praiseworthy singing group called "The Sons of Erin." worked on a magazine affair which they distributed three times a year. Then in 1962, Dan O'Hanley broke the tradition by making the Red and White a monthly newspaper. This practice continued until last year when it became a bi-monthly effort, although since that time, Roger is the only editor to publish the paper with any degree of consistency.

Since his appointment to the editorship last April, he has published nine issues—a remarkable record indeed.

And on the subject of the paper, one of the most discussed articles on the campus concerns the recent announcement that the fees at St. Dunstan's will not be raised next year. This is indeed a noteworthy statement, considering that 11 other universities intend to raise their tuition and board charge by a hundred dollars.

The move has generated deep resentment by the Association of Maritime Students, and only at the last minute did AMS decide to call off active demonstrations and a one day walkout, although several universities did stage them anyway. However, the association, representing 15,000 Maritime students, did send telegrams to Prime Minister Pearson, Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, and Premiers Stanfield and Robichaud asking for remedial assistance through grants.

Just by way of comparison, St. Dunstan's tuition rate is now only \$400, \$100 less than the lowest of our neighbors, and over \$200 less than Mt. Allison and UNB for similar courses. As the communique sent to the Prime Minister pointed out, the situation is serious and must be met immediately.

It is believed that no one from AMS has approached the Prince Edward Island government as yet. Perhaps Mr. Shaw will have a chance to discuss this issue when he speaks at St. Dunstan's next Wednesday at a meeting of the PC Club.

CLASS ELECTIONS

Although the Students' Union executive has already been chosen for next year, election fever continued last week with the nominations for four class presidents. This is a departure from the former practice of electing the class heads in September or early October, but it is felt that under the new system, there will be more continuity in the council than in previous years.

The Freshmen started the election parade on Monday, choosing Phil MacDougall to head the Class of '68. A Freshman Arts student, Phil succeeds Bob Hickey of Summerside. The Sophomores selected Ted Richard, a science student from Sherwood. The only non-Islander elected to the presidency is Dick Trotter of Montreal, who succeeds Jim Griffith. Yesterday, the Engineers elected capable Carl Cheverie to head that august body—a noble task indeed.

Roger MacDonald completed his term as editor-in-chief of The Red and White this week with the publication of his last issue of the paper, judged here to be the best effort ever distributed at SDU. Roger broke a record of sorts this year by putting out more issues than any other editor since the paper was first started in 1904.

SUMMERSIDE — Earl Hayes was re-elected president of the East Prince Fish and Game Association at the association's annual meeting here Friday.

Nelson Currie, president of the provincial fish and game association, said at the meeting a brief containing suggested fish and game amendments was submitted to Hon. Leo Rossiter, minister of natural resources, for approval. Members of the association expressed concern as the bill was not introduced during the legislature session. The brief would, in effect, make changes for the betterment of the fish and game act, it was stated.

In the business, President Hayes gave his report on the installation of the second de-

PARIS (Reuters) — France and Russia have signed an agreement to co-operate in putting the French SECAM color television system into operation and invited other countries to join them.

The SECAM system is in competition with color television systems developed in the United States and West Germany.

The agreement was signed two days in advance of a meeting of the International Radio Consultative Committee in Vienna to adopt a single standard for European color television from the three competing systems.

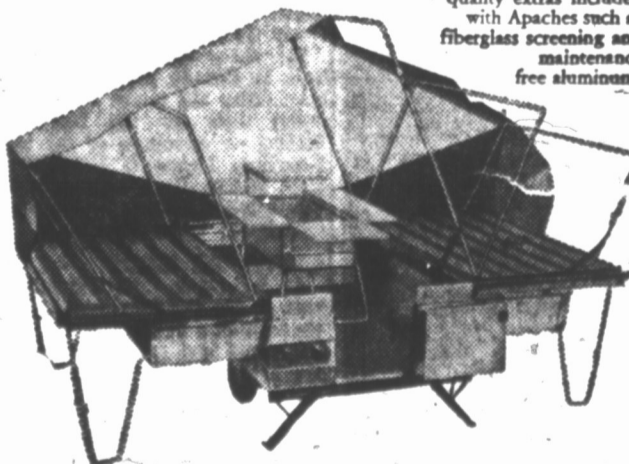

The pretty brunette, who had listened to the race on radio with other nurses at an apartment on Queen Street, Saturday was almost breathless with excitement when interviewed.

On learning of Jay Trump's victory she dashed home where she was greeted by her mother,

sister, Helen, and a large number of neighbors.

The young nurse had no definite plans for using the major portion of her new-found wealth, but she does propose to visit Ireland, accompanied by her mother, to collect her winnings.

Miss MacKenzie also stated emphatically she intends to continue with her nursing career, despite her stroke of fortune.

Miss MacKenzie's triumph was the second within a year for a Prince Edward Islander. Last June Dr. Cyril Sinnott won a similar amount when his horse, Santa Claus, romped home an easy winner.

Panel On Teenage Drinking Ends Successful Session

"Teenage Drinking" was the subject of a panel discussion by students as a wind-up for the fifth annual Alcohol Education Conference. Over 133 delegates attended the two-day conference which ended Saturday at the Charlottetown Hotel and the meetings were described as the most successful ever staged on P.E.I.

Saturday morning delegates heard a keenly interested group in informative panel talks on how the care and rehabilitation of the individual suffering from alcoholism is affected by the society in which he lives and his attitude. It was headed by Dr. J.E. Carten, director of alcohol education and rehabilitation for New Brunswick.

Participants in the discussion included Sister Mary Henry, Catholic Welfare Bureau; P. Mc-

Connell, of the provincial mental hospital; Dr. M.E.W. Gooderham, alcohol and drug research foundation of Ontario; and Rev. Ross Howard, chaplain at Riverside Hospital.

Particular phases of education also were under review with Rev. David MacDonald, Alberton, discussing the part played by the spiritual advisor, and Eugene Macdonald, provincial director of child welfare, telling of the role of the family unit.

Friday a large dinner gathering, which included people and professions from all areas of the province, heard Dr. Gooderham tell of the inner need of the alcoholic for spiritual aid and how each must be able to find that aid in his own way and practice his own form of religion. "Let those of us who

profess to be Christians at least practice the example we have been given," he said in urging understanding of alcoholics. "Sickness makes no selection of dogma or creed."

The conference was planned and held under the chairmanship of David Boswell, provincial director of alcohol studies.
