### RAILWAY BUS SERVICE FROM SACKVILLE TO CH'TOWN - S'SIDE

MONTREAL, June 18—Additional summer services to and from Prince Edward Island were announced here today by the Canadian National Railways. Effective Monday, June 28 a bus will leave Charlottetown at 7:45 a.m. and travel via Bonshaw and Borden to Sackville, N.B., where it will arrive at 11:15 a.m. to connect with the Ocean Limited for Montreal. A second bus travelling via Summerside will leave Charlottetown at 12:30 p.m. and arrive at Sackville at 4:45 p.m. to connect with the Maritime Express for Montreal. Both bus services will operate every day except Sunday.

Eastbound a bus will leave Sackville daily except Sunday at 6:00 a.m. for the convenience of passengers from both the Ocean Limited and the Scotian. This bus will reach Charlottetown at 9:45 p.m. and will travel via Bonshaw. A second bus will also leave Sackville at 6:00 p.m. but will travel via Summerside and arrive in Charlottetown at 10:30 p.m. Baggage which has been checked to and from Prince Edward Island will be transported in trucks to connecting trains. There will be ample accommodation in the buses for hand baggage.

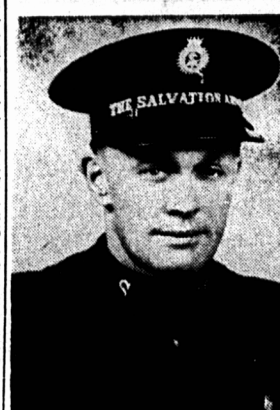
### Inquiry Into Psychopathic Cases

Theories and psychiatric beliefs relating to the law regarding criminal sexual psychopaths were told yesterday to a three-man Royal Commission which is inquiring into the subject with a view to possible changes relating to them in the Criminal Code. Sitting on the Commission were Mr. Justice J. S. McRuer, president, Chief Justice of the High Court of Ontario; Dr. Gustave Desrochers, vice president, and Judge Helen Kinnear. Witnesses heard were Dr. A. J. Murchison, Director, Division of Mental Health, and Dr. John Theriault, psychiatrist.

Dr. Murchison expressed his belief that criminal sexual psychopaths could not be considered normal, nor could they be termed insane. He said they were responsible mentally and physically for their sex crimes. He referred to the so-called "comic books" and said many of them were unfit even for adults to read as they made violence, sadism and obscenity seem natural.

The witness said that despite a Criminal Code provision against printing or selling such crime comics and the efforts of religious leaders and civic and business groups various undesirable publications of this type continue to find their way to Canadian newsstands. He also called attention to the fact that though the Criminal Code provided sentences for convicted criminal sexual psychopaths there is no mention of corrective or preventive measures to be used. "In my brief on the law of insanity as a defence in Criminal cases I considered it advisable that Federal penitentiaries have attached psychiatric units. These could carry out a corrective and preventive program in the treatment of the criminal sexual psychopath, as well as research programs into the causative factors imitating criminalistic sexual behaviour. The primary consideration in dealing with any criminal is the protection of society in general; in dealing with criminal sexual psychopaths, the protection of children and young women is of paramount importance." Continual patrols are being kept on the smudges which are burning.

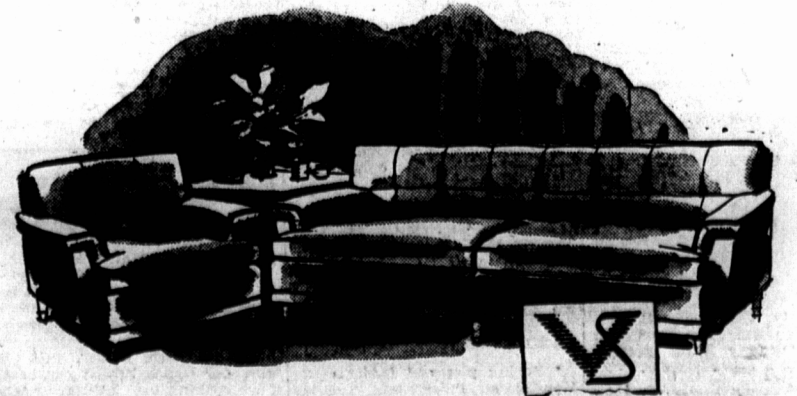
