INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

King Christian of Denmark celebrated his seventy-ninth birthday on Wednesday last.

England sent 350,000,000 messages by telephone last year, 37,000,000 more than the year before.

Small diamonds have been discovered in the sand taken from a lake formed by the crater of an extinct volcano in the Witzies Hoek mountains in Natal, which are beyond the hitherto known diamond fields.

Here's hope for humanity! A Paris doctor has discovered the microbe of baldness and has exhibited it at the St. Louis hospital, together with a sheep inoculated with it which had lost its wool. He is now hunting for the means of destroying the microbe by rendering it innocuous.

Fifty years ago England imported three eggs a head for its population, last year it imported forty for each inhabitant, the whole number being 1,589,387,000. Many come from Russia, which exported 1,500,000,000 eggs last year, and more from Italy.

At Oak Island, Lunenburg county, work is still proceeding for Capt. Kidd's buried treasure. A few days ago one of the men at work named Kaiser was killed while drawing water from one of the money pits. Capt. Welling, who is in charge of the work, arrived in Halifax on Friday and reports that all his men have gone on strike. Since the accident which resulted in the death of Kaiser the men have become superstitious and will not continue to dig for Kidd's treasure, for love or money. Following the death of Kaiser one of the men had a dream in which the spirit of Kidd appeared and warned him if he went on with the search they would all be dead men. Next morning all hands quit work. Capt. Welling has since been holding the fort alone pending the arrival of less superstitious men from Halifax.
