Many Gunners Out Over Week-end

A large number of gunners were out on the ponds, marshes, rivers and in the fields of western Prince County over the week-end following the opening of the season on ducks, geese, Hungarian partridge, pheasants and woodcock, on October 10.
First reports indicate an unusual scarcity of ducks inland with somewhat better results for those shooting in the Casumpeo Bay area. No reports were received on anyone bringing down a goose but many were seen flying well out of range. Pheasants and woodcock are not usually found in the area but many large coveys of Hungarian partridge were reported with good results to the hunters locating them.

Half-Ton Truck Damaged By Fire

A 1952 one-half ton truck belonging to Mr. Meddie Wedge, proprietor of the Myrtle Street Market, in Summerside, sustained damage estimated by its owner to be about \$400, in an unusual fire of unknown origin which took place at Mr. and Mrs. Wedge and 12-year-old daughter were driving towards Summerside on the highway between Wellington and Miscouche about 10:30 Sunday evening.
The odor of burning rubber drew the attention of the occupants of the truck and upon investigation they found both rear tires and the truck undercoating extending from the back of the truck to the cab to be on fire.
Action on the part of passing motorists who assisted Mr. Wedge in extinguishing the fire prevented the truck from being a total loss.

The speaker told of his college career, and professional activities following graduation and his subsequent release from the army due to drinking. "I find in A. A. a fellowship that helps me, and will help anyone who so desires to keep away from that first drink which is the one that leads down to ruin."
The meeting, which was presided over by a member of the Charlottetown group, was opened with an address of welcome from the president of the local membership. He pointed out that many members of A. A. were still in the grip of an acute personal problem and admonished all to continue in a wholehearted contribution towards solving the great problem of alcoholism.

Musical Entertainment

A lively sing-song, conducted by Mr. Frank MacIntyre and a short but highly entertaining musical programme was provided following the banquet, two numbers being contributed by the Brooklyn trio, Johnnie Beers, Mac Monroe and Al Bruce. The former also singing a baritone solo. The trio composed of Nancy MacNevin and the Rupert sisters, Barbara and Marilyn, were heard in two numbers while a solo by Mr. Frank MacIntyre completed the programme. Messrs. The chairman briefly described the purpose of the meeting, which was an exemplification of the 12th step in the A. A. programme, "to carry the message and to assist in whatever way possible those who still suffer from the effects of alcoholism."

Three speakers addressed the meeting. One was a doctor, another a lawyer and the other a housewife. All were alcoholics and the stories of their lives with its misery, heartaches and tragedy were frankly revealed. The rehabilitation which the Society was able to effect in these such seemingly hopeless cases was strongly impressed upon everyone present.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer, after which a reception for members and their friends was held at the club-room of the Charlottetown group. An evening meeting at the same place brought a most successful Inter-Group conference to a close.

Discussed Promotion Of Inter-Provincial Travel

"Greater emphasis will be placed on the promotion of inter-provincial travel as a result of discussions which took place at this year's Canadian Tourist Association convention," according to Mr. George V. Fraser, director of the Prince Edward Island Tourist and Information Bureau, who returned during the week-end from the Association's conference and annual meeting in Vancouver and Victoria.
The convention adopted a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to study ways and means of keeping Canadians at home for their vacations. "Prince Edward Island with its proximity to the two heavily populated Central Canadian provinces and its seaside holiday attractions should be heavily favored if such traffic is further developed," Mr. Fraser said. "We have already been going after this business with increased advertising in Maritime and Central Canadian newspapers, with travel publicity stories, and with travel displays such as the one in the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show," he added. Last year there was a marked increase in the number of Ontarians on the highways of Prince Edward Island.

Another resolution called on the Federal Department of Transport to provide increased facilities at international airports to cope with the heavier traffic at these points.

The question of lengthening Canada's tourist season by moving Labor Day to the third Monday in September again came up for discussion. It was decided that a committee in charge of that project keep pressing the matter with the government, labor leaders and educational leaders.

Canadian Cuisine
Canadian cuisine also came in for considerable discussion following a report by Mrs. F. M. Montgomery of the Canadian Tourist Association. Mrs. Montgomery said the province of Quebec was the only one in Canada with a distinctive cuisine. She stressed the need for more regional dishes. A Calgary delegate

complained that he was unable to find a restaurant in British Columbia where he could get fresh salmon. Other delegates also complained that seaside provinces do not always provide seaside menus.

The 200 delegates were given an excellent Chinese dinner at a leading restaurant in Vancouver's Chinatown and it pleased me to find out that a leading Chinese restaurant in Summerside is well up to the standard of its counterpart on the West Coast," said Mr. Fraser.

Mr. Fraser, who was re-elected director of the Association, was chairman of the Nominating Convention at the Association's annual meeting held in Victoria. Ralph Moore, deputy minister of Economic Affairs for the Province of Alberta, was re-elected president.

Radio Pioneer Dies In Montreal

MONTREAL, (CP)—Donald Macdonald, 76, radio transmission pioneer, died Saturday night at his home in adjacent Westmount. Born in the Isle of Skye, he joined the English Marconi company in 1905, transferring to Harrington, Nfld., two years later. He served at Pictou and Glace Bay, N.S., before being made manager at Toronto. He was in charge of overseas communications at the head-office in Montreal during the Second World War. He retired in 1946. Among survivors are his widow, the former Katherine Wyatt Fraser of Pictou, a daughter and a son.
