**Strange But True**

Siamese twins are as rare in the bird world as they are in the human race. Some years ago Siamese chickens were hatched from a double-yolked egg on the farm of John Jewell, North River. The chickens were joined together at the backbone. One ate until it had enough, then they would tumble over and the other chicken would eat.

Because of their combined height their mother could not cover them properly. When they were still little things they became sick after a cold snap and died. I can vouch for the truth of this item as I saw the chicks myself many times.

Now back to the news. A couple of sparrows were hatched under the eaves of the home of Floyd Wilson, near Clarksville, Ohio. Wilson noticed that the birds always were close together. He observed the pair more closely and this is what he found. They were joined together at their legs.

Wilson took the sparrows to Dr. James Young, a vet in New Providence, Tennessee who separated them. Dr. Young said Siamese twin birds are rare and estimated there is approximately 1 chance in 1,000,000 that siamese twin birds would hatch and live.

The birds are now back at Wilson's home, learning to fly all over again - this time solo. Did you know that every Scottish year begins and ends with fire festivals? During the main festival the Coast dwellers set fire to model viking galleys in the harbor waters. And at Burghhead on the Moray Coast the 'clavie' is put to the torch with a lot of small details that are strictly observed. This event takes place on the 12th, the date of the old new year. What is a clavie? Well, it is made from tar and herring barrels. Custom forbids the use of a hammer so a stone is used instead. The nails must be borrowed, not bought. The long keynail is wrought by a local smith. When the clavie is put together it is filled with sticks and tar and set on fire. Then a man's shoulders are inserted in the understructure of spars and the clavie is carried through the principal streets while bubbling tar falls on the man underneath.

Then on the second Friday of September the women dress in colorful costumes, and, led by the town band, they parade through the streets, each female carrying

a small doll also dressed like the women. This curious custom, dating back centuries, is known as "The Fisherman's walk." Of unknown origin is the "burry-man" and a stranger custom would be hard to find in any part of the world. A man in tight-fitting clothes is covered all over with burrs of the burdock plant. Next he is dolled up in ribbons and flowers. During his lone tour of the streets he must speak to no one. But the Border country furnishes the best variety of celebrations. Each August there is a public service commemorating the battle of Otterburn. The flag of the Red Douglas is spread over the ruins of the chancel. The grave-stones serve as seats for the crowd. At a given signal the town band plays hymns and while the minister is preaching all musical instruments are laid on the grass. This strange custom is said to have been brought into use after the death of the Red Douglas in battle. Ambition was rewarded in our forefathers' days. Now its punishment is higher taxes.

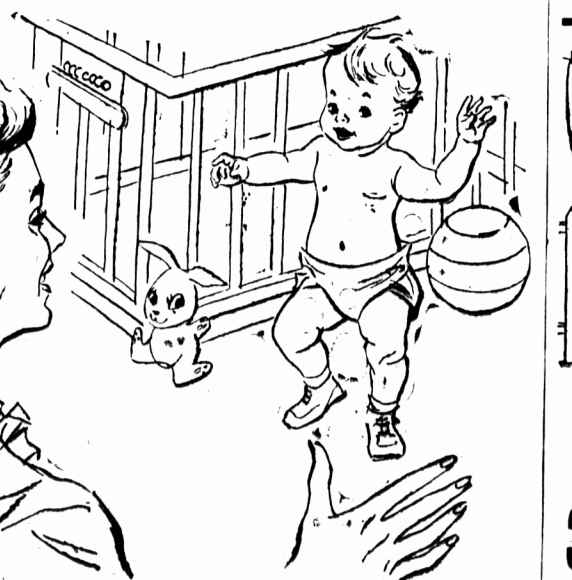
