# RUSSIANS THREATEN AS V-E DAY CELEBRATED BY ALLIES

LONDON, (AP)—The Western allies celebrated the 10th anniversary of the victory over Germany Sunday with the paradox of embracing their old enemy as a new ally.

The now sovereign West Germany will formally be taken into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization today. The Western German people, however, remembered the Nazi surrender in silence. No public ceremonies were held.

"This is no day for noisy demonstrations," said the Neue Ruhr Zeitung. The Russians devoted hundreds of words to denunciations of the Paris agreements whereby Western Germany joins NATO. Speaking in Moscow, Marshal Ivan Konev said: "It is to be regretted that 10 years after the end of the war Germany still remains partitioned and has no peace treaty."

**AIMED AT SOVIET**  
The Paris agreements, providing for the revival of a revanchist German Army, are aimed at furthering the race and preparations of war against the Soviet Union and the countries of peoples democracy.

**Korean Veteran Goes To Prison**  
ELIZABETHTOWN, N. Y. (AP)—James A. Call, a Korean War air combat veteran who turned deserter, pleaded guilty Saturday to second-degree murder in the killing of a Lake Placid policeman and was sentenced to 20 years to life in prison.

### Son-In-Law Held In Double Montreal Shooting

MONTREAL (CP)—An elderly couple were shot to death Saturday in their two-story home at suburban Lachine, and police said they are holding the couple's 30-year-old son-in-law for questioning in the spectacular shooting.

**HEARD SHOT**  
Of the slaying itself, Inspector Charron gave this account: A man entered the Roy house at about 1 p.m. Saturday by the back door, probably while Mrs. Roy was in the kitchen and Mr. Roy was at the front door talking to the milkman, Gerard Lefebvre.



Inspector Charron said the murder weapon, described as a .38-50 rifle, had been bought only that morning from a Lachine hardware store.

**Subdue Man**  
Two constables arrived in police car and helped subdue the man. The constables then entered the house and found Mrs. Roy lying on the floor, bleeding from the chest. Her husband had been shot through the heart and died instantly.
