LIONS MAKE DONATION

Suspended Sentence Is Given Accused

A two-year suspended sentence was handed down in Queens County Magistrate's Court Wednesday to George Arthur Cudmore, Harrington, charged with willfully failing to provide adequate food and water for three horses, 12 pigs and 10 cows.

The accused, arraigned before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, was required to enter into recognizance a bond of \$1000 and must not for the two-year period, own or possess, either directly or indirectly any kind of animal or bird whatsoever with the exception of a dog presently owned by Mrs. Cudmore. Mr. Cudmore, who had previously pleaded guilty to the charge, was counselled by Bert Campbell.

The Crown called one witness this morning in the person of Dr. R.R. Webster of Parkdale. Dr. Webster said that in his opinion some of the pigs in question were definitely undernourished, that a couple of cows and the horses were thinner than normal. One horse was dead when he visited the farm but he was unable to state the cause of death. He said that lack of adequate food and water could be the cause of the animal's condition. He also admitted there could be other causes such as parasites making use of the animals' food intake.

Dr. Webster said that with the exception of the condition of some of the pigs he had seen other animals on other island farms in the same condition as the horses and cattle. Magistrate Johnston said that he felt a jail term or fine would not serve the purpose as well in this matter as a suspended sentence because as soon as the term was up or the fine paid the

accused would again be able to possess animals. Counsel for the accused said that the suspended sentence ought to teach the accused that if he wishes to have animals he will have to care for them properly. Arthur Edward Herrell, City, was fined \$100 and costs on an impaired driving conviction. Counsel for the accused was Lester O'Donnell.

CASE ADJOURNED
Loman Harold Bell, City, charged with failing to stop when a school bus was discharging children had his case adjourned to March 23. Counsel for the accused was Ian MacLeod.

Wilson and Moore Ltd. Parkdale charged with an infraction of the Income Tax Act in that they failed to send to the Receiver-General of Canada tax deducted from their employees, had their case adjourned to March 9. A plea of not guilty was entered. Frank Sigsworth acted for the accused. J.F. Smith requested the adjournment on behalf of the Crown.

One accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on a charge of illegal possession of liquor.

Liquor Sales In Province Reported Near \$6 Million

Gross sales of liquor in the province reached almost to the \$6,000,000 mark in the P.E.I. Liquor Control Commission's fiscal year ending March 31, 1965.

According to the commission's annual report, tabled in the Legislature yesterday, sales were \$5,975,135, an increase of approximately \$983,000 over the previous year's sales. The gross profit on liquor sales for the 1964-65 fiscal year was given as \$1,925,402, compared to a profit of \$1,679,072 in the previous year.

Net sales by the retail outlets in the province as shown in the report, were: Alberton, \$216,506; Borden, \$296,532; Cardigan, \$408,046; Charlottetown beer store, \$623,876; Charlotte-

town spirit store, \$1,406,165; North Rustico, \$31,495; Souris, \$928,189; Summerside, \$1,067,246; Tignish, \$166,494, and warehouse sales were \$641,792.

Total individual liquor purchasing permits issued by the commission in the year covered by the report was 12,341 and there were 27,155 tourist permits issued. The report showed that of March 31, 1965, there were 23 licensed clubs operating in the province, 29 military canteens and 11 dining rooms had been licensed to sell liquor.

Gerald E. Dawson and George Eric Dawson, both residents of Central Beque were further remanded to March 9 on similar charges of having possession of stolen goods.

Neill Mills, charged with failing to report to RCMP to have his vehicle reinspected was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

A resident of Northam charged with illegal possession of liquor was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Father Boyce Heads Renewal

A special "University Renewal" will be directed by Rev. Edward Boyce CSsR of Windsor, Ontario, at St. Dunstan's University beginning March 3rd at 8:00. The general theme of the renewal will be "Can Faith Meet the Challenge of Our Changing World?"

Traditionally, two separate compulsory retreats, one for men and another for women, were held each year at the University. Both men and women are free to attend the renewal.

Delegates attending the session will register at the Hotel Saturday morning and the course is scheduled to conclude early Sunday evening.

The course will cover emergency welfare service in both war and peace time disasters. Local lecturers at the session will include: Brig. W.W. Reid, Brig. A.W. Rogers and Orlin Simons, provincial civil defence co-ordinator.

Other lecturers for the course will be: George Pirie, Halifax, Atlantic area regional director for emergency welfare services; J. Anderson, Helen Sackville; O. White and Florence Montgomery, all from Ottawa.

Approximately 50 people from various parts of the Island are expected to attend.
