Court Orders Lawyer To Appear In Contempt Case

OTTAWA (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada Tuesday summoned Toronto lawyer Lewis Duncun to appear before it Dec. 9 to show cause why he should not be cited for contempt of court. The court order was based on an unprecedented application by Mr. Duncun Nov. 18 in which he said the administration of justice would not be served by Mr. Justice Charles Locke remaining on the bench to hear a case to be argued by Mr. Duncun. He wanted Mr. Justice Locke to be disqualified. However, Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin, following consultation with others on the bench, rejected Mr. Duncun's motion. However, Mr. Justice Locke then withdrew voluntarily, stating he did not know Mr. Duncun nor did he know anything about the case to be heard. He was withdrawing because of the stand the lawyer had taken. The court's order noted that Nov. 18 Mr. Duncun made certain statements to the court. In hearing, the case to be argued show cause why he should not be cited for contempt for these remarks. At Toronto, Mr. Duncun said he had not received the court order. Blast-Off Hour Changed Several Times Last Night

CAPES CANVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Technicians ordered a further one hour delay Tuesday night in the zero hour test for the first attempt to fire U.S. moon into space. The latest word was that the 11-hour countdown preceding the Vanguard firing will begin at 10 p.m. EST 12 a.m. AST. The firing itself was rescheduled for high noon 1 p.m. AST. There was no explanation for the delay. The countdown at first had been set to begin at 9 p.m., then it was pushed up to 11 p.m., still later set for midnight and finally programmed for 1 a.m. Originally, the navy had said that it hoped to fire its satellite carrying Vanguard rocket about an hour before dawn. Technicians apparently have solved difficulties which cropped up in Monday's weather and guided the Vanguard for the shooting. "There were a few hags in the way of the counter of space," from the office of naval research, "but I think we've ironed them out and now we will be ready to blast off tomorrow." If the firing is successful, the U.S. will have met the first step in the challenge to the free world to join Russia in launching a man-made satellite in the heavens. The 72-foot 22,000-pound Vanguard stood tall on its launching platform Tuesday night pointing straight up into the sky. A thrust of powerful engines designed to propel it 300 miles up to the counter of space. SIX-INCH SPUNNIK In its bullet-shaped nose cone carried a six-inch satellite with a radio voice which the navy hopes will be heard in the next 18,000 miles. Exactly two months ago today, the Russians launched Sputnik I. On Nov. 3, Sputnik II, with its dog, Laika, was launched. Whether the U.S. effort is a success or failure will not be known here until the end of the first announcement will be made by the defence department in Washington, probably about Dec. 10.

Winter Employment On Nava Barracks Assured

Angus Maclean, one of the Federal members of the Quebec County, enclosing a copy of a resolution they had passed urging that work on the new building be started immediately to provide winter employment. The tender for the new barracks closed in Ottawa Nov. 28 and Hon. Mr. Green assured the local committee that the work of reviewing the tenders would be expedited so that the contract will be awarded as soon as possible. ATHENS, Greece (Reuters)—Unprecedented snowfalls and low temperatures sent shivers over normally mild Southern Europe Tuesday as the entire continent is in the grip of winter's first big freeze. From London to Athens, the temperature dropped to freezing or below. International railway traffic across Greece to Turkey and Yugoslavia came to a halt as up to 15 inches of snow swept the hills of Thessaly and Macedonia. High winds whipped the Ionian sea and several ships were reported in trouble. Equally hard hits were southern and central Italy where snow cut off scores of villages. About 60 villages in the Abruzzi mountain area were isolated. Snow clogged highways. Falls of up to three feet were reported in many areas and temperatures were down to 10 degrees.

Century-Old Butter Factory Destroyed By Fire Yesterday

A chimney, a hot water tank and the ruins of the machinery and other equipment are all that remain today of the Beaulieu butter factory. The building was destroyed Tuesday morning completely destroyed the building and equipment of the company which had been in operation for a century.
