SOME RECENT SHIPMENTS.—The Summer Pioneer says: Mr. Fawcett, of Sackville, shipped 285 sheep for the Halifax market on Friday, and on Saturday nine more were sent across by him. On the latter day Mr. Thos. P. Lougher sent to Nova Scotia six horses and another was shipped by Mr. D. Campbell for St. John. SAILED.—The schr. Maggie Alice, Capt. James Lunnigan, left Souris for St. Pierre, Miq., yesterday, with the following cargo: 35 head horned cattle, 145 sheep, 32 pigs, averaging 280 lbs. each, 4 tons fowls, 7,000 feet hardwood plank, 18 tons pressed hay, 200 bushels potatoes, 100 bushels turnips, 600 bushels oats and 7,000 staves. Besides this varied cargo, the Maggie Alice has on board one well-known passenger, a widower, bound for the ancient colony on an interesting mission in which is concerned one of the fair maids of Lamaline. LAST TRIP THIS SEASON.—The steamer Coban, Captain Robert Fraser, arrived from Montreal en route for Sydney and St. John's, Nfld., on Sunday morning, and left again about noon to-day. Her outward cargo included 38 sheep shipped by Blake Bros.; 64 sheep and 15 bags barley by Whistly & Sons; 21 bbls parsnips, George J. Wright; 10 bbls parsnips, Carvell Bros.; 65 bbls potatoes, 6 bbls oysters, 11 bags oats, John Kelly & Co.; 1 crate and 5 boxes mutton and poultry, Wm Boyle; 4 bbls potatoes, M J Dalton; 30 tubs butter, Geo H Tombs; 6 tubs butter, 1 bbl beef, Patrick Duffy; 2 bbls oatmeal, John Carroll; 118 rolls leather, 10 bbls potatoes, E Love & Sons; 27 boxes and 1 case biscuits, 8 qtrs beef, Peake Bros & Co; 60 bbls pork, B & M Rattenbury. The passengers were Mr Peard, Mr McIsaac and Miss Brown. AGAIN INSURED.—On Saturday last, Philip Murray, a man well-known about town, met with an accident while at work in a well at Johnston's River, that will likely result in death. It appears that at the time of the disaster, Murray was about half-way down the well when it was between thirty and forty feet deep) striking the sides, when a large bucket filled with stones tumbled from the top of the well upon him. The force of the fall knocked the poor fellow from his perch to the bottom of the well with the bucket and its contents upon top of him. After a good deal of trouble he was taken from the well more dead than alive, and the same evening was brought to town for medical treatment. On examination it was found that several ribs were broken, and that he was badly injured about the body and head. This is the second time that Murray has been seriously injured while working about wells.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Brazilian Affairs. WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. Dr. Valente, Brazilian Minister, on Saturday received a cablegram from Rio de Janeiro stating that United States Minister Adams had established relations with the government now in control of affairs of that country. This information was communicated to the State Department. It is reported that he urged upon the secretary the expediency of this government instructing him at once to complete the act of formal recognition. Probably the act of formal recognition through our minister will be postponed until the official head or chief executive has been chosen in pursuance of some regular method. LONDON, Nov. 24. Two British warships have been ordered to Rio Janeiro. Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Nov. 25. Parliament will meet for the despatch of business on the 16th of January, 1890. Peter White, M. P. for North Renfrew, is likely to be made Deputy Speaker for the House of Commons, vice Colby, appointed to the cabinet. The name of Hon. Wm. McDougall is mentioned in connection with the vacant chief law clerkship of the Commons. Colby, M. P., will return to Ottawa on Monday, when he will be sworn in as president of the Privy Council. A writ for a new election in Stanstead will be issued at once. Wholesale Poisoning. VIENNA, Nov. 24. The Nagy Beeskerch inquiry, which has been going on for the last several years with the object of discovering the cause of the large number of sudden deaths which have occurred there resulted in proving that thirty eight victims were poisoned and a lot of them were married. Female fortune tellers supplied the wives of the victims with poison. Fifty seven arrests have been made. The Poisoned Candy Case. ST. JOHN, Nov. 24. Saturday afternoon the Grand Jury came into court and reported that they had found a true bill against William J. McDonald, charged with the murder of Mrs. McElae. In addition to the evidence submitted to them, given at the preliminary examination, the jury had before them a celebrated Boston expert on handwriting who swore to the writing on the boxes as that of McDonald. Aiding an Exhibition. OTTAWA, Nov. 24. The Dominion Government has granted an appropriation to aid in the extension and development of the Exhibition of Fruit Growers of the Dominion, to be held at Ottawa next February, at which delegates will be present from the various provinces, and prizes will be offered for dried, preserved and late-keeping varieties of fresh fruits. French Politics. PARIS, Nov. 24. In the Chamber of Deputies on Saturday, article 3 of the measure proposed by Leydel in favor of allowing the free manufacture of matches was rejected. The action resulted in the withdrawal of the bill. Rouvies, Minister of Finance, thereupon announced that the government would establish a direct monopoly of the business. Big Loss By Fire. MONTREAL, Nov. 24. Fire broke out last night in the Montreal Herald office, completely wrecking the interior of the building. The loss to the Herald Company will be about \$30,000, partly covered by insurance. This is the third time within seven years that the Herald has been burned out. Is This True? OTTAWA, Nov. 24. It is stated that the Dominion Government will shortly surrender to the British Columbia Government all the rights to minerals, excepting coal, in the railway belt through the Rockies, in return for a quid pro quo not definitely agreed upon. More Whiskey Seized. OTTAWA, Nov. 24. Another schooner loaded with whiskey was seized near Quebec yesterday. The whiskey was confiscated, but the vessel was allowed to go on depositing a sum of money. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, Nov. 25.—10 a. m.
