- Q. How can I clean white satin shoes?

BANANA WALNUT BREAD

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup butter or shortening
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 1/2 cups mashed bananas
 - 2 1/2 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts.
- Cream sugar and butter. Add unbeaten eggs and beat hard. Add bananas. Sift flour and measure, then sift again with salt and soda. Add to first part with chopped walnuts. If batter is too stiff add a tiny bit of milk—sour is best. It won't take more than 1/4 cup and shouldn't need any.

That Body Of Yours

COMPLETE BED REST NOT ALWAYS ADVISABLE IN CHRONIC CASES

During an acute illness such as the "flu" or the common cold, the physician puts the patient to bed for a short time until he sees just what the illness is doing to the patient as to heart, blood pressure, blood (increase in white corpuscles), general muscular strength. This few days rest, with very little extra burden put on the heart, keeps the heart strong to meet any complication that may arise such as pneumonia following flu or a cold. However, when the patient is ill and likely to be ill for more than the few days, the physician does not insist upon complete bed rest, but allows the patient to be up in an armchair or wheel chair with, in some cases, short walks with the bedroom or ward, with toilet privileges.

One of the chronic diseases now receiving much attention which may some day remove it from the "incurable" class is multiple sclerosis. Sclerosis means hardening or closing and multiple sclerosis is hardening of segments or portions of the spinal cord. Naturally this hardening means that these portions of spinal cord will not properly provide the nerve and muscle needs of certain parts of the body. The outstanding symptoms of multiple sclerosis are (1) spastic gait or walk (legs stiff then move fast), (2) moving of eyeballs from side to side, (3) scanning speech (frequent pauses), (4) weakness and numbness of the legs.

In Postgraduate Medicine, Dr. H. Jones states that a hopeless prognosis (likely outcome of illness) should never be made. Disturbances of vision are often the first signs, usually partial blindness, double vision, movement of eyeballs from side to side or in various directions. Weakness and exhaustion are present. Spasticity (legs held together then move rapidly) is the worst disabling feature, one or all four limbs may be affected. There are feelings of numbness or entire loss of feeling in the limbs, pain in 20 per cent of cases. At the onset, the symptoms come

Oysters—For Gourmets

(From "Saturday Night")

Good news for gourmets is the stepped-up oyster farming program which is being carried on in Prince Edward Island and near Shediac, New Brunswick. Canada is at the northern limit of the range of the Atlantic oyster, which extends as far south as the Gulf of Mexico. In the southern section, where the water is warm, production is heavy. But north of Boston, practically the only oysters are found are those in the sheltered waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Growth is slow, though, and reproduction has been uncertain; only half of the year is warm enough for feeding and only a few weeks for spawning. The quality of these oysters, due to the cold Atlantic current, is unexcelled. This, in former years, was responsible for over-exploitation.

Here is a recipe for Prince Edward Island fried oysters sent in by Mrs. Myron C. Bell, her husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton C. Bell opened Milton's Old Spain 27 years ago).

Fried Oysters (P. E. I. Style)

- Ingredients:
- 1 1/2 pints oysters
 - 2 eggs
 - 1/2 tsp salt
 - 1/4 tsp pepper
 - 4 tsp milk
 - 4 tsp flour
 - 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
- Drain the oysters. Beat eggs well, add the milk, and beat again. Dip each oyster into the flour, and then dip it into the egg mixture. Finally, dip lightly into the bread crumbs, without pressing them on, so as to keep them fluffy and light. Fry in deep fat, 375 degrees F. for 2 1/2 minutes. This quantity will serve five people.

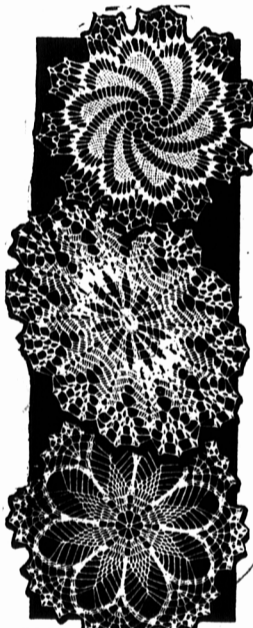
