

IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM ARTHUR MacEACHERN

William Arthur MacEachern passed away in the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, N. S., on December 1, 1955, in his 75th year. Born at West River, P. E. I. He was the son of the late John MacEachern and Jane MacDougall. He had been living at Debert for the last two years with his daughter Mrs. Norman E. Day and was formerly from Charlottetown.

The late Mr. MacEachern had been ill for the past year, but in spite of the best of medical care, he failed to rally and passed peacefully away with a heart attack. He will be well remembered as when a boy he worked with the late Benjamin Heartz which was known as the Heartz Farm East of Royal. He also worked with the late Frank R. Heartz, and later worked for twenty years at the P. E. I. Hospital.

The late Mr. MacEachern was of a quiet disposition and always ready to help at any time of trouble. He was a member of Zion Presbyterian Church, and his place was seldom vacant when he was well.

He leaves to mourn besides his widow Sadie Matheson formerly of Charlottetown, one son Gordon, Amherst, N. S., two daughters Pearl of Debert, N. S. Ruth Mrs. Norman E. Day, Debert, N. S. The funeral service was held from Zion Presbyterian Church on Dec. 3 by the Rev. W. H. Brown, who spoke words of comfort and hope to the bereaved. The hymns sung were: "The King of Love My Shepherd Is" and "Abide With Me". Interment was at the Peoples Cemetery, Rev. W. H. Brown also officiated at the grave.

Apologizes For Magazine's Brink Of War Headlines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Editor-in-chief Henry R. Luce Saturday apologized for "unfortunate" brink-of-war headlines in a Life magazine article which brought a storm of world controversy swirling around State Secretary John Foster Dulles.

"If anything in our account of the secretary's position caused any misunderstanding among our readers or the public, we heartily regret it," Luce said in a statement issued from his New York office.

At the same time Luce struck out at critics of Dulles and the magazine article. He declared that any fault on the part of Life "was furiously compounded by those who, for the moment, put prejudicial or personal advantage above the best interests of the United States."

Luce is a supporter of President Eisenhower. The editor said Life alone was responsible for the article, both as to "substance and philosophy."

SHORTENED AND EDITED He did not say that Dulles was incorrectly quoted, but declared that the article as originally written by Life's Washington bureau chief, James E. Shepley, had been shortened and edited by Life and that the headlines did not fully reflect the main emphasis of Dulles' remarks. This emphasis, Luce said, was on the administration's "vigorous pursuit of peace."

On the cover of the Life edition containing the article was the caption: "Three times at brink of war: how Dulles gambled and won." The headline on the article itself read: "How Dulles averted war. Three times, new disclosures show, he brought us back from the brink."

The body of the article quoted Dulles as saying that the administration walked three times to the verge of war—over Korea, Indo-China and Formosa—and averted it by "strong action." Dulles was represented as saying that the ability to get to the verge of war and yet avoid it is a "necessary art" of diplomacy.


