Death Of Well Known Islander In Vermont

The death of Mr. Fred L. Rogers who was well known to thousands of Islanders, occurred at Brattleboro, Vermont, Tuesday morning at the home of his son, Hubert Rogers. The late Mr. Rogers was 85 years of age and had been in good health until a few hours previous to his death.

Mr. Rogers was born in Alberton in June, 1864, the son of the late Hon. Benj. Rogers, a former Lieutenant Governor of this Province and his wife Susan Hubbard of Charlottetown. His wife predeceased him several years ago. Surviving are Mr. Wendell Rogers of St. John, N.B., Mr. Hubert Rogers of Brattleboro, Vermont, and a daughter, Francis, in Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Rogers' death is the first break in a family of six. He is survived by three sisters and two brothers. Mrs. G.N. Gordon of Brookton, Mass., Mr. Charles R. Rogers of Summerside, Mrs. J.E.C. Hunter of Alberton, Mrs. Col. C.J.C. Stewart of Charlottetown, and Mr. R.H. Rogers of Charlottetown.

For many years the late Mr. Fred L. Rogers was associated with his father in business in Alberton and later entered the silver fox ranching industry and was one of the early promoters of the Fox business. During his late years he lived in St. John, N.B. and after the death of his wife divided his time between Brattleboro, Vt. and Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Rogers was intensely interested in politics and took a large part in activities of the Liberal party in the western part of the Province. He was widely known as a writer and student of public affairs.

The funeral will take place in Saint John today.

Retail Merchants Ass'n Annual Banquet Held

The first annual meeting and banquet of the recently organized Retail Merchants Association Ltd. was held in O'Leary yesterday afternoon and evening. The meeting elected the first permanent board of directors which later met to elect the following slate of officers: President, P.M. MacCaul, Ellerslie; 1st. vice president, Claude McNeill, O'Leary; 2nd. vice president, J.P. Gaudet, Richmond; 3rd. vice president, H.E. Phillips, Conway; secretary-treasurer, J.J. Moran, Alberton; directors, John Foley, Bloomfield and J.B. MacKay, Coleman.

Mr. MacCaul, who had previously been elected provisional president, presided at both the business meeting and the dinner. The petition for incorporation was read to the meeting which gave the duties of the officers and the by-laws of the Association. Any independent merchant in the Province is eligible to join. A financial report was read by the secretary-treasurer.

The meeting was addressed by Lt. Col. Frank Storey, president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade who in a very interesting and enlightening address stressed various ways in which a retail merchants association can help its members and their employees. He mentioned such ways as obtaining uniformity of observance of holidays, hours of sale and how it can help, in cooperation with boards of trade, in advising the Government on matters relating to the retail trade. A press committee was appointed consisting of H.A. Jelly, O'Leary and J.B. MacKay, Coleman. An advertising committee was also appointed consisting of J.J. Moran, Alberton, Cyril Leard, Alberton and C.J. Gallant, Bloomfield. Its duties will be to inform the customers and wholesalers and the general public of the aims of the Association.

Lt. Col. Storey mentioned that over one million dollars of retail sales leave Prince Edward Island every year to mail order houses etc. And he suggested that the advertising committee could seek to lay before the public the desirability of purchasing more at home. A purchasing committee was also appointed at this meeting consisting of H.A. Jelly, O'Leary; J.B. MacKay, Coleman; Harry MacWilliams, O'Leary.

Over 100 persons were in attendance at the banquet, which was sponsored by the O'Leary Women's Institute and held in the new Legion Hall. Rev. W.G.
