

OTTAWA (CP) — External Affairs Minister Sidney Smith, who announced a committee to study the first anniversary of the United States atomic bombing for appearing to have turned negatively to the cause of the atomic bomb.

Recent advances in science, he said, have presented "an ever new situation" in world politics that demands recognition and reassessment.

Smith said he had read press reports of Russian suggestions, especially by the Soviet secretary Nikita Khrushchev, that the "big powers" be invited to Canada, as a middle power, but would not have been invited.

The idea has been rejected in Washington. "It is not the view of the Canadian government that we should always say 'no or noyet' (Russian for 'no') to a Russian proposal," he said.

SMITH HAS QUESTION Later B. Pearson, Mr. Smith's predecessor as external affairs minister, made this question a subject of his first affidavit.

Smith said he was "impressed at the reception by official sources and the press" of his remarks in Washington to a proposal for a high-level conference, but he was "disturbed when we read a proposal for a high-level conference party secretary Nikita Khrushchev to read press reports from Washington quoting these spokesmen to the effect that it is to be turned down."

"Later, in Washington, a state department spokesman disputed Mr. Smith's contention. The spokesman, who declined to be identified, suggested that contented press reports might be a blame for any such impression."

He was inclined to agree, however, with press suggestions that the radio transmitter, evaporator and boiler, will take care of humidity.
