The Rev. Mr. Enraught, the ritualist, elects to remain in prison.

The "Agence Russe," of St. Petersburg, says that the Kurds have returned to Turkish territory.

Mr. Thomas Carlyle has just completed his eighty-fifth year. His friends show much anxiety about the state of his health.

Lord Beaconsfield has received 133 offers to translate "Endymion" into French—94 from ladies and 39 from gentlemen.

Bismarck always says that Austrian law concerning the clergy are more stringent than is possible in Germany, but the Vatican does not complain of them.

A despatch from Rome says that Cardinal Jacobini, in a circular to the nuncios abroad announcing his appointment as Papal Secretary of State, urges upon them calmness and conciliation.

The Garibaldian Philhellenic Committee has published a manifesto which the government, in view of the friendly relations with all the Powers, has deemed inexpedient to allow to be posted up in the streets.

The shares of the Panama Canal have been taken up almost entirely in France. French financiers consider that the immediate success of the scheme is now assured. One house alone is said to have taken nearly one hundred thousand shares.

The King and Queen of Italy will probably spend Christmas at the capital. Their enthusiastic reception at the opening of the Theatre Costanzi proved their popularity to be steadily increasing, and a very unusual number of the great Italian families have come to their court this winter. Rome is crowded with foreigners.

A despatch to the "News" from Berlin says:—"A meeting of 2,000 persons was held, at which resolutions were passed in favor of the suppression of the liberty of the Jews to return so liberal to Parliament who will not promise to vote for such suppression and to buy nothing from Jewish shops or firms."

It is reported that an English banker, acting in the name of the ex-Empress Eugenie, has arrived in Paris for the purpose of extricating Mme. de Friedland, goddaughter of the ex-Empress, who, with her husband, Baron de Friedland, is under arrest; Mme. de Friedland being charged with forging her grandmother's signature to acceptance.

In Ireland, several Land League meetings have been prohibited by the government. Yielding to Count Harry von Arnim's repeated solicitations and on the strength of medical certificates the court at Berlin has granted him six months' respite before undergoing the terms of his sentence. The public prosecutor has appealed against this decision. The Count's health is in a desperate condition. He is staying at Nice.

Advices from Acera, on the West Coast of Africa, under date of Nov. 18, are as follows:—Disagreements arising between the Colonial Governor and the native King, the population, including the Fantees, assumed a hostile attitude toward the few Europeans here. Just as the situation became critical the British gunboats Foam and Dido were sighted, when the King was privately arrested and taken on board one of the vessels and sentenced to sixteen years' imprisonment.
