90-Foot Dredge Is Launched In Sydney For Use On P.E.I.

A 90-foot dredge built for the federal public works department for use in Prince Edward Island harbors was launched in Sydney, Wednesday. Contractors were the Sydney Engineering and Drydock Company.

The vessel, to be designated dredge No. 10, will replace time-worn Dredge No. 14, which will be laid up, a spokesman for the federal department said in Charlottetown yesterday.

The new PWD craft will be christened later this week by Mrs. Clive Currie, wife of the Prince Edward Island and resident engineer for the public works department.

Kings Co. 'Still' Case Opens At Montague

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

The case of Louis Alan Joseph Acorn of Lower Montague charged with having a still in his possession suitable for the manufacture of illicit spirits under the Excise Act opened in Kings County Magistrate's Court at Georgetown yesterday.

Acorn pleaded not guilty to the charge and after the testimony of two RCMP officers, Cpl. S. D. A. Wannamaker and Constable James Dunn was heard, the case was adjourned until Nov. 25th. The accused is represented by John P. Nicholson of Charlottetown and Melvin J. MacQuaid, Souris represented the excise department. The offence is alleged to have taken place at Brudenell on July 14th.

Magistrate James B. Johnston presided over the court.

A Murray Harbor South resident who had previously pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace by fighting contrary to a Town of Montague by-law was fined \$10 or 10 days.

Wendell Paynter of Souris charged with a hit-and-run offence had his case adjourned to Nov. 25th.

Russel William MacIntyre of St. Stewart who was charged with driving while intoxicated had his case adjourned and with no plea being taken to Nov. 25th. The same party was also charged with unlawfully taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner, commonly called joy riding. This charge was also adjourned to Nov. 25th with no plea being taken.

George Sextus MacPhee of St. George's charged with having the care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired had his case adjourned to Nov. 25th. He was also represented by Mr. Nicholson.

Two residents of Charlottetown, both charged with having liquor in their possession in a place other than their residence were each fined \$20 and costs.

A resident of Montague and one of Brooklyn both pleaded guilty to charges of driving with out due care and attention. The Montague resident was fined \$10 and costs and the Brooklyn resident \$15 and costs.

A resident of Murray Harbor North was fined \$5 and costs for having defective equipment on his motor vehicle.

A resident of Montague charged with failing to stop when signaled by a peace officer failed to appear in court. His case was adjourned to Nov. 25th.

MREC OUTLINED

An outline of the work of the Maritime Religious Education Council was given yesterday by Rev. J.B. Wilson, Truro, N.S., field secretary for the Maritime United Baptist Convention.

Later in the morning Rev. L.M. Murray gave a talk on "the worst music children hear."

The main feature yesterday morning was an address by Dr. MacLean who said there has been a widening interest in the subject of religious education in schools, apart from the opening of school with scripture reading and prayer.

SUMMERSIDE — Mr. and Mrs. Victor Sanderson of Summerside and P.H. Lyle of Central Lot 16 recently returned from a six-week tour of the British Isles and continental Europe during which they visited England, Scotland, France, Belgium and Holland.

In England, Mr. and Mrs. Sanderson visited the grave of their son Flight Sergeant Kimble Sanderson who was killed in action with the Royal Canadian Air Force on Sept. 3, 1943. He is buried in Botley Cemetery in Oxford.

In London the party paid visits to such outstanding tourist attractions as the Parliament buildings, Madame Tussaud's Wax Works, Windsor Castle and they worshipped at Westminster Abbey.

In Holland they went to the Canadian war cemetery at Nijmegen and especially noted the excellent condition in which these cemeteries are kept under the direction of the Imperial War Graves Commission.

Driver Is Guilty On Hit-Run Count

Sterling Cotton of Springhill P.E.I. was found guilty in police court yesterday afternoon of failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

Magistrate R. S. Hinton fined the accused \$150 without costs or two weeks in Prince County jail. Mr. Cotton's license was also cancelled for a period of four months.

The charge resulted from an accident at the corner of Water and St. Stephen Streets on the evening of Oct. 16 when Percy Weeks was struck by a car and knocked unconscious. The driver failed to stop.

During the morning and afternoon sessions a total of five witnesses were heard including Mr. Weeks, Police Officers Elmer Matheson and Ralph Hardy, taxi driver Charles Murray and Robert Tidmarsh RCAF Station, Summerside.

Former Mayor Of Souris, Dr. A. H. Smallwood Passes

SOURIS — A former mayor and councillor of the Town of Souris Dr. A.H. Smallwood, passed away at his home on Oct. 27th. He had been a member of the Souris town council for 20 years and had served three years as mayor.

While a member of the council he was the chief instigator of having an electrical system installed in the town and devoted much of his time to the supervision and operation of the generating plant until the Maritime Electric Company assumed the operation a few years ago.

He was the third last surviving member of the original Souris band.

Dr. Smallwood was born in Markland, N.S., and at an early age entered Robbs Foundry in Amherst as an apprentice machinist. He followed this occupation for a few years in Halifax and Pittsburg, U.S.A. before entering dental college in Baltimore, Md. and graduating as a dental surgeon. He began practice in Souris in 1906 and was active until about a month ago.

He was predeceased by his first wife (Mac MacIntyre) and two brothers, Dr. Fred Smallwood of Charlottetown and George of Florida.

His funeral will take place Friday afternoon from his late residence to Souris West cemetery, service starting at the house at 2:30 p.m.

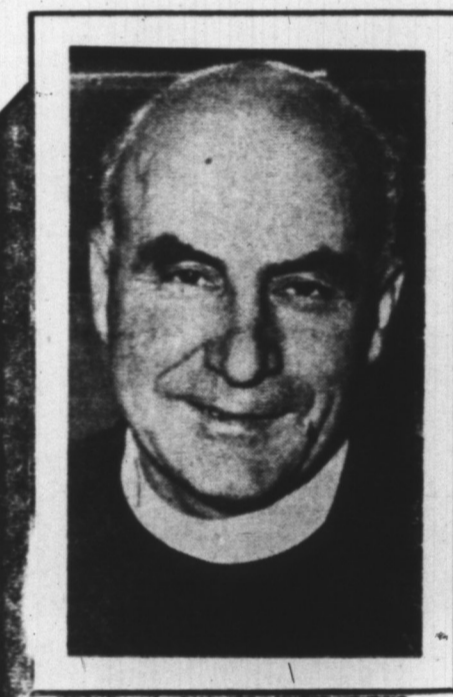
