She immediately rushed next door and phoned the Summerside Fire Department, who quickly responded to the call. The hardwood floor in one corner of the room was badly burned as was a chesterfield chair, scatter rugs, window drapes, window casing, and baseboard under the window. The fire was confined within the living room, and fortunately was discovered before more damage was done to the home.

Tribute From Pulpits To Late Sovereign

Yesterday in many of the Summerside churches the services were in the nature of a tribute to the late King George VI.

Prayers were recited, special hymns sung and sermons in most churches paid tribute to the King and invocations for the guidance of the new Queen Elizabeth II.

At St. Mary's Anglican Church a memorial service was conducted for the late King and special prayers were said for the new Queen.

"God Save The Queen" was recited as a prayer with the congregation kneeling.

While the members of the congregation were communicating the hymn sung was "And Now O Lord Mindful Of The Law".

Other hymns sung during the service were, "Where The Light Forever Shinneth", "Let Saints On Earth In Concert Sing With Those Whose Work Is Done".

Venerable Archdeacon G. R. Harrison delivered a most impressive discourse in which he referred to the many admirable qualities of the late King, stressing his humility.

There will be a special service at 3:00 o'clock on Friday afternoon in commemoration of the funeral of the late King.

At St. Paul's Rev. G. J. MacLellan said that the world was shocked at news of the death of the King.

"He was a good king," he said, "a good man, he was a family man who loved his home life; a life adorned with Christian virtues, the virtues which should adorn every family man. He was a brave man, too for even during the war when danger was at its greatest, he remained with his people, even though his own home was bombed. He relied on the staying power of God. His Christian character was reflected in his Christmas messages to his people."

"These virtues made him beloved of his people for even in his poor health he was ready to sacrifice himself."

"It is good and great to have a king who relied on God for help, and now his daughter has begun her reign in the same manner. It is our bounden duty to pray for her and we solicit your prayers for the new Queen that her reign may bring peace to the hearts of all men."

Other Churches At the Presbyterian Church special prayers were said for the new Queen and the service ended with "God Save The Queen" as a prayer.

In common with other United Churches throughout Canada, as requested by the Moderator, special services were held in Trinity United, where the minister, Rev. Daniel Matheson, delivered an inspiring sermon, taking as his theme "Majesty and Love".

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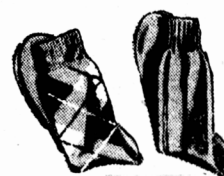

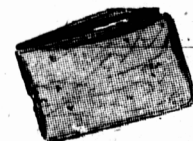
