LIBERAL METHODS.

A Member of the House of Commons Stumping Ontario in a Provincial Election

WHILE HE HOLDS A PROMISE OF A GOVERNORSHIP.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—The Mail and Empire charges that Mr. D. C. Fraser, M. P., is stumping Ontario for the grits with the appointment of Governor of the Northwest in his pocket.

It is generally known here that he has the promise of this appointment; but your correspondent is in a position to state that another man has had the same promise. His name is David Laird, and he holds an undertaking from Sir Louis Davies.

A DISABLED STEAMER.

Towed Into Halifax Harbor.

HALIFAX, Feb. 28.—The French Line passenger steamer La Champagne, five days overdue, for New York, was towed in here yesterday by the steamer Roman, with tail shaft broken. The disabled steamer had a thrilling experience, in a helpless condition, on the banks of Newfoundland.

THE TRURO MURDER CASE

Lyman Dartt to Go Free.

HALIFAX, Feb. 28.—Lyman Dartt, recently found guilty and sentenced to death at Truro for the murder of an Armenian pedlar, is to be discharged. The Minister of Justice has decided that the evidence in the case is consistent with the boy's innocence: that there is absence of motive and that he shall be discharged.

Bread Riots in Spain.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—There is an appalling scarcity of food in many of the provinces of Spain. Bread riots are of daily occurrence.

Lord Salisbury Unwell.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Lord Salisbury is slightly indisposed.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW YORK.—Feb. 26.—A despatch to the World from Madrid says: "Admiral Terry, secretary chief of the staff of the Minister of Marine, says: 'The harbor of Havana contained no submarine mine in the vicinity of the place where the battleship Maine and the Spanish cruiser Alfonso XII were anchored.'"

LONDON, Feb. 26.—The Calcutta correspondent of the Times says there is every prospect of one of the best harvests ever gathered in India.

PARIS, Feb. 26.—It is semi-officially announced that Colonel Picquart, the chief military witness for Zola during the

latter's trial, will be placed on the half-pay of a lieutenant. A despatch who wrote a letter containing Zola's name has been placed upon the unattached list, and Professor Grimeaux, of the Polytechnic school who signed the endorsement of Zola's action, has been released.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash. Feb. 26.—The steamer Pioneer returned at midnight from Skagway. The Pioneer's officers report both Dyea and Skagway as lively but law-abiding. Captain Nelson says that while thousands of people are landing at Dyea, the population does not appear materially to increase, as the majority of those landing there are destined for interior Alaska, and are pushing forward with little delay. Both the Chilkoot and White passes are reported in good condition. On the way down the Pioneer passed 24 vessels en route to Alaska, all crowded with passengers and freight. The Pioneer experienced the worst weather that has prevailed in the North Pacific for many years. Continuous high wind and blinding snowstorms prevailing.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 26.—Senor Dupuy De Lome, who arrived here yesterday on board the White Star line steamer Britannic, is quoted as saying in an interview: "I have decided not to speak on the subject of the letter. I can, however, say I have been the victim of misrepresentation. The news published in the American papers and sent to this country and my own was, from the commencement to the end, made up of lies of the most infamous character. The allegation in the American papers that the terrible explosion of the Maine was the outcome of a Spanish conspiracy is, in my opinion, another instance of the reckless manner in which newspapers in America agitate popular prejudice."

LONDON, Feb. 26.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News, who interviewed M. Zola yesterday, says: "He appeared fatigued, but was quite frank, natural and unconcerned. He had not a word of regret or bitterness in his conversation, and he expressed great pleasure at knowing that foreign nations almost universally sympathized with him."

David Christie Murray, who interviewed M. Laborie on behalf of the Daily News, says: "M. Laborie has little hope of a revision of the sentence, and no hope whatever of its reversal. M. Zola, however, will be even better treated than first class misdemeanants in England. He will have a suite of rooms, access to books and newspapers, many personal comforts and the privilege of receiving visits from his wife and friends."

A REFORM COUNCIL.

STR.—For obvious reasons it will be impossible to change the constitution of the water commissioners enabling them to undertake the offices of sewerage. It would be foolish on the part of our citizens to create a third elective body for this sole purpose. We have governing combinations enough. Better add to the efficiency of those we have, and fit them for their work. If we can't trust them with one work they are not fit for the other. Let the sewerage be introduced by the city council, reconstructed as follows:—

- 1st. Eleven councillors, elected by ballot by the collective (and registered) vote of the whole city, and to receive a salary of \$150, each during construction—not to exceed two years—and \$50 a year after completion.
- 2nd. Candidates to deposit a nomination fee of \$20 to be forfeited by those getting less than one-fourth the total votes polled.
- 3rd. Councillors to have a properly recorded qualification and each to furnish \$5000 bonds during the construction of sewerage.
- 4th. An independent vote to be ensured and our citizens protected from the onslaught of fifteen or twenty candidates by a fine of \$100 to be imposed upon the aspirant making any personal canvass.
- 5th. The newly constructed council to be elected before commencement of sewerage operations.
