

# "Feels Fine" To Be Free Even If A Bit Worried

HALIFAX (CP) — How does it feel to land in a strange country with strange language and customs, your wife and two children to support and no job, and not knowing exactly where you are going except that it's somewhere in Canada and you hope to make a new life there?

László Kozma, 32, of Budapest, says it's fine to know you're in a free land but naturally you're worried about the future and whether things will turn out as you hope. Kozma, his pretty 25-year-old wife Elizabeth and their children Mary, 9, and László Jr., 5, were among 1,589 Hungarian refugees who landed here from the Greek ship Venezuela Saturday.

**SOUND FOR EDMONTON**  
Today they are watching the snow-covered Canadian countryside flash by as they travel westward to Edmonton and whatever the future may bring. A few weeks ago Kozma was a jeweller in Budapest. His wife worked in a tailor shop. Then the November revolt changed everything.

"I speak a little English but not very good," he said as he sat on a bench in the Halifax immigration building, his neatly dressed family around him, waiting to answer questions the immigration men would ask.

Were they going to Edmonton or Winnipeg? His face lit with a smile. "Yes, Edmonton . . . Edmonton," he said, repeating the name with difficulty several times. An interpreter asked him about the fighting in Hungary. "I went to the Parliament buildings in Budapest," he answered in Hungarian. "That was where the fighting was centred. A friend and I drove a car carrying wounded to the hospital. For three days and nights we drove it."

"We hoped Hungary would get its independence but it turned out otherwise. . . . Then we knew all those who took part in the revolt would be arrested and there was nothing to do but get out. . . . We left everything behind us," he said. "All we have is two shirts and the clothes we are wearing. . . . I worked making jewellery in Budapest. I hope to do the same sort of work in Edmonton. We haven't any money now so I'll have to start as a worker."

"We want to learn English as soon as we can," Mr. Kozma told the interpreter. "Mary was in the third class in school," she said with a mother's look at her daughter. "We hope she can start going to school again. Laslo is too young yet. He is only three."

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## IN MEMORIAM

### R.W. GRANT MACCALLUM

A large circle of relatives and friends were shocked to hear of the sudden passing of Grant MacCallum which occurred at his home in Brackley Beach on Thursday afternoon, Dec. 6th.

Apparently in excellent health, he was about his work as usual when he was stricken with a heart attack and passed away before medical aid could be summoned.

Words fail to express the place he held in the lives of all who knew him, always kind and considerate, ever ready to aid in every worthy cause, and keenly interested in all that pertained to the betterment of the community. Truly it may be said of him that everyone was his friend and he a friend to all.

During World War I at the early age of 17 years he answered his country's call and enlisted with the 8th Siege Battery. In the course of action he was twice wounded and in the Battle of Passchendaele was gassed. After demobilization he resumed his studies at P.W.C. after which he went to Western Canada, where he resided until 1934. Shortly after returning to his native Province he was appointed Warden of the National Park at Brackley Beach and later at Cavendish. Over the years he zealously performed his duties with unflinching courtesy, winning the love and respect of all with whom he came in contact and was keenly interested in the progressing development of the Park.

He was a member of the Canadian Legion and was associated for many years with the Order of Masons. Born in Brackley Point 38 years ago he was a son of Mrs. John A. MacCallum and the late Mr. MacCallum of Brackley Beach Lodge. Besides a host of sympathizing friends he leaves to mourn a grief-stricken mother, two sisters, Mrs. Mrs. Compton, Calgary, Elaine (Mrs. Willard MacCallum) Brackley Beach, and a brother Edward, also of Brackley Beach.

The funeral service which was held from his late residence was very largely attended despite the unfavourable weather and was conducted by Mr. Karl English and Rev. W.H. Fosythe and Rev. T.A. Wilson. A solo "All The Way My Saviour Leads Me" was feelingly rendered by Mr. Stanley Lancaster. The profusion of floral tributes testified to the high esteem in which he was held.

The pall bearers were Gordon Shaw, David Seaman, Fenton MacLure, Bradford Murray and Earle Skeffington. Interment was in Brackley Point Cemetery where the Last Post was sounded over the flag draped casket by Bugler William D. Chaisson.
