Premier Jean Lesage said here he told the legislature he has no intention of "prolonging the current session for this matter." Current plans are to prorogue the session Aug. 6 or Aug. 7. "I would be very surprised if we found ourselves in a position to present legislation on Churchill Falls before the end of the session," the premier said. "It is possible that we will be forced to convolve a special session later in the fall."

He said negotiations between Hydro-Quebec and the British Newfoundland Corp. on exploitation of the Labrador Falls are continuing but that no final agreement is yet in sight.

Agreement in principle during last week's federal-provincial conference in Ottawa on reduction of federal taxes on privately-owned utilities such as Brinco was expected to facilitate an agreement.

A main point of discussion has been the price at which Brinco will sell power from Churchill (formerly Hamilton) Falls at the Labrador border to clients outside of Quebec.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Opening lead—seven of clubs. Some hands spell trouble; but the danger signs are not always easy to read. For example, take this hand from the Argentina-United States match in 1961, where both North-South pairs got out on a limb.

At the first table, with a U.S. pair North-South, the bidding went as shown. It is hard to fault North for bidding a diamond-and-then-two-hearts; and it is also difficult to criticize the two spade bid.

Very few players would pass two spades with the North hand. While some might bid only three spades sitting South, many would jump to four to show the hitherto unrevealed strength.

West doubled and led a club. East won with the ten and returned the king. Declarer took the ace and played a spade to the jack. West took the ace and returned a heart, the queen losing to the king.

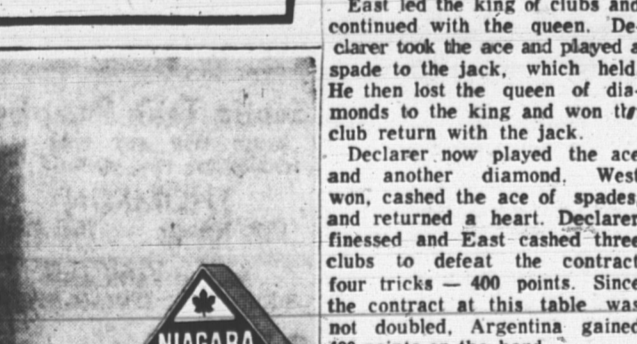
East led the queen of clubs, West overruffing the nine with the ten. West returned a diamond, the queen losing to the king. When East now played a club, West was bound to score his six of spades, and the outcome was that South went down three-300 points.

The Argentine North-South pair at the other table bid the hand this way:

South	West	North	East
Pass	Pass	1♦	2♣
2♠	Pass	2♥	Pass
4♣	Dble	2NT	Pass

East led the king of clubs and continued with the queen. Declarer took the ace and played a spade to the jack, which held. He then lost the queen of diamonds to the king and won the club return with the jack.

Declarer now played the ace and another diamond. West won, cashed the ace of spades, and returned a heart. Declarer finessed and East cashed three clubs to defeat the contract four tricks—400 points. Since the contract at this table was not doubled, Argentina gained 400 points on the hand.



Income Tax Comparison Is Given

CHICAGO (AP)—United States residents pay more federal income tax than their neighbors in Canada but less than the British, says a study conducted by a private concern.

The study says a U.S. resident with two children under 16, will have to pay \$290 in income tax for this year at the \$5,000 income level, assuming he takes the standard deduction and files a joint return.

A Canadian of similar family and financial status will pay only \$223 while a Briton will pay \$770, the study adds.

For the \$10,000 income level but with the same size family the figures are United States \$1,114, Canada \$999 and Britain \$2,146, the study says.

The study was made by Commerce Clearing House, a private reporting authority on tax and business law. It said the figures reflect the second stage of a U.S. income tax reduction, a recently-enacted Canadian tax reduction and a British increase.

STUDENTS PROTEST RUFFLES TAILCOATS AT OLD SCHOOL

LONDON (AP)—A student protest is ruffling the traditional tailcoats at one of England's oldest and most elegant boys' schools.

Says the Eton College Chronicle: "With considerable regret we feel that school dress has had its day."

The Eton Chronicle is the student publication of Eton College, founded 325 years ago by King Henry VI.

For generations a large proportion of Britain's prime ministers, cabinet members, members of Parliament, literary figures and business and industrial leaders have been Eton graduates.

Asked about the protest, Headmaster Anthony Chenevix-Trench said: "Let us say the matter of dress is being given some thought, but there will be no change in the immediate future."

"What was with-it (fashionable) yesterday, is the height of eccentricity today. The added emphasis of distinctive clothing to class differences is not, in 1965, the most tactful of approaches."

The real reason behind the protest appeared, however, to be more down to earth. "There is the waistcoat for instance," said the Chronicle. "It is a thermostat in reverse, often stuffingly hot at this time of the year, and yet none too warm in January."
