

Reservoirs Analysis Committee Gets Brief

Provincial research director Hartwell Daley submitted a 42-page brief, containing some 20 recommendations, yesterday to the provincial government's advisory committee on resource development.

Consultant Walter R. Shaw, a member of the advisory committee, said the committee, "facing a critical situation, held a meeting with Mr. Daley. The recommendations developed from a series of meetings the committee is going to take a more active role in the program."

"Already between 1,200 and 1,400 people are involved and the more communities have applied to take part in the program. For these reasons the committee feels something will have to be done to cope with the situation."

"The research department will have its staff increased and immediate steps will be taken to co-ordinate provincial government resources by this month department will play a greater role in the development program."

"There is a strong possibility that a special report on the program will be tabled at the next session of the legislature and there may be some legislation dealing with the program presented for consideration."
