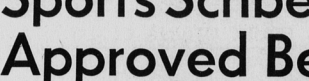

Sports Scribe Says Angels Approved Belinsky Trade

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Herald-Examiner sports writer Bud Furllo said Monday night that general manager Fred Haney of Los Angeles Angels has approved a deal that would send southpaw pitcher Bo Belinsky to another American League club.

Furllo said Angels manager Bill Rigney was to meet later Monday night with Cleveland general manager Gene Paul and field boss Birdie Tebbetts. The Angels will give Cleveland Belinsky and another unnamed player for pitcher Gary Bell and two unnamed Cleveland players, Furllo added.

The proposal doesn't work out, the Angels have other proposals in mind. In the meantime, Belinsky is being proved from one starting rotation and will have to do bullpen duty, Furllo said.

The assignment of Belinsky to the bullpen brought a warning from Angels' pitching coach Marv Grissom that Belinsky and pitcher Dean Chance would be allowed to clove around.

Belinsky and Chance will have been fined for violations of the team's curfew regulations, the last time \$200 each.

Belinsky haven't even discussed sending Bo to the minors," Rigney said. "He's got enough stuff to get by."

Never Bend May Not Run In Third Leg Of Classic

NEW YORK (AP) - Cain Hoy Stable's Never Bend, second in the Kentucky Derby and third in the Preakness, apparently is out of the third big race in the Triple Crown series—the Belmont Stakes at Aqueduct June 8.

The horse's owner, Capt. Harry F. Guggenheim, said Monday Never Bend is being pulled out of racing until he recovers fully from an ankle injury suffered at Keeneland this spring.

"I don't know how long that will be," Guggenheim said. "It certainly seems doubtful that he will be able to run in the Belmont."

One report was that the Cain Hoy race, winner of \$12,484, probably would not be fit until the fall.

"That is a bit presumptuous," the owner said. "We have been nursing the ankle, hoping it would come around all right. Now we have decided that we should give the horse a rest and let the ankle heal thoroughly."

Never Bend ran a good second to consider Chateaugay in the Derby, 1 1/4 lengths back and ahead of the favored Candy Spots. However, he was a disappointing third in last Saturday's Preakness at Baltimore, the Candy Spots won the Preakness, 3/4 lengths ahead of Chateaugay.

BOSTON (AP) - Minnesota Twins shelled Boston out of the American League lead Monday night, downing the Red Sox 6-5 on home runs by Earl Battey, Bob Allison and Harmon Killebrew plus tight relief pitching by Bill Dalry.

Dalry came on in the seventh inning the Red Sox had scored two runs off of Earl Battey, Pascual and Garry Roggenbuck and famous Frank Matzone, the league's leading batsman, with two men in scoring position.

Virus Invades Downs Track

HALIFAX (CP) - About 30 horses housed at nearby Scaville Downs Raceway have been affected by an influenza-type E virus.

Dogs general manager Jack Cruickshank said it appeared to be the same type of virus which has struck other harness racing tracks in Canada and the United States.

The cold every measure possible is being taken to prevent a further spread and to treat the horses already affected.

Veterinarian Dr. K.R. Anstie said the virus, referred to as a variant of another strain, has been isolated "but it will take time...to develop a serum for its prevention."
