CRICKET.—The match yesterday was won by the West End team, with a score of 52, to the East Enders' 48. Wm. Murray and Dr. H. D. Johnston bowled for the West End, and R. Satalife and F. Hutchinson for the East.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, one drunk was fined \$2 or 8 days, a nuisance case was disposed of for a fine of \$1 or 4 days, and the case of a man charged with neglecting to support his wife and children was adjourned until Friday.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court at Georgetown adjourned on Saturday. In the case of James Young vs the London & Glasgow Insurance Company, judgment was given for the plaintiff for the full amount claimed, \$742.88.

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The P. E. Island Hospital has received the following: \$8.12 from the Christian Church, New Glasgow; \$5.50, collected at Falconwood, by Wm. McPhail, Esq.; \$17.50 from the Presbyterian Church at Summerside.

HORSES AND LAMBS.—The Pioneer says: On Saturday seven horses were taken over by Mr. M. H. Fowler, of Hampton, for the St. John market. Mr. O'Brien also took away 135 lambs for the same place. There have been no large lots of horses going lately, although one or two have been taken away almost every day.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.—The I. C. R. coal shed and cattle shed at River du Loup were destroyed by fire on Thursday night of last week. The coal shed contained some 1200 tons of coal, the loss of which at the present time, when the strike at Springhill is in progress, is quite a serious one. The loss will amount to several thousand dollars.

OBITUARY.—We regret to learn, through cablegram received by Messrs. Peck Bros & Co. to-day, of the death of Alexander Pitcairn, Esq., senior partner of the well-known firm of Messrs. John Pitcairn & Sons, London, England. This gentleman's death will be regretted by the business community as well as a number of friends, by whom he was warmly and deservedly respected.

HE WAS DISCHARGED.—M. S. Goodstein, a German pedler, appeared before William Heard, Esq., J. P., this morning, under a warrant taken out against him by another German in the same business, charged with selling goods without a license. After hearing the case the Magistrate discharged the prisoner. J. T. Mellish appeared as counsel for defendant.

FREE CONCERTS.—We understand that the Citizens Band, under the leadership of Mr. Gibbesith, will give another open air concert on Queen Square Thursday evening next, and that these concerts will be continued twice each week until further notice, on Monday and Thursday evenings. The large number of persons who attend these concerts show how they are appreciated by the people generally. But what about the electric lights and the fountain?

THE RIFLE.

SHOOTING IN ENGLAND, Canadian's Winnings

Toronto, July 21. The Empire's special cable 30-day is as follows:

"The Canadian team had good luck at Bisley to-day. The day's winnings amounted to £120. Firing commenced this morning in the St. George's match, seven rounds at 600 yards. Private Hutchison, of the 43rd Battalion, Ottawa, won £5 and a badge, and Capt Sealand, of the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, and Staff-Sergt Ogg, of Guelph, £2 each. In the Prince of Wales competition, seven shots at two hundred yards, and fifteen at six hundred, for nineteen prizes, Captain Bishop, of the 62d Battalion, Halifax, won £5, and Sergt. Ogg, of Guelph, £3. The day's competition closed with the daily telegraph match for 113 prizes. Corp. H. Morris, of the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, won £3, and Lieut. E. Smith, of the St. John Rifles, and Sergt. Horsey, of the 45th, Bowmanville, £2 each. The competition for the Kolapore Cup takes place on Wednesday. Lieut. Smith will be in the Kolapore eight for Canada.

Sampling of Molasses.

Ottawa, July 21.

The Minister of Customs has decided under authority of section six of the last amended tariff act to have regulations framed and issued for the better sampling of molasses, by which the average saccharine strength as shown by the polariscope test of each consignment or cargo shall be accepted as the strength for duty, provided it is shown that such consignment or cargo of molasses comes within the wording or meaning of item 156 of the amended tariff. This, it is believed, is in accordance with the representations of the deputation of molasses importers who waited upon Hon. Mr. Bowell a few days ago. The customs department has refused the application for permission to export two saws, to be placed in Central Park, New York, the Canadian law expressly prohibiting the exportation of deer.

Drought in New England.

Boston, July 21.

The damage in New England by the present drought is now past recovery, whatever the future weather may be. Some northern localities have been favored with showers during the week, but most of the district has been without rain sufficient for the growing season for weeks. Corn and tobacco in the low lands are still in fair condition. Potatoes are much injured, except early plantings. Pastures are drying up, rendering early feeding of stock necessary. Streams in the low beds of shallow creeks and lakes are dry. Grass is the only abundant crop, and a large yield of excellent hay has been cut and secured. The second crop is of little value, and will not be cut except on bottom lands.

Severe Censure.

Chicago, July 22.

The Coroner's Jury, investigating the steamer Tioga explosion, rendered a verdict this afternoon, recommending that J. C. Bright, of Buffalo, President of the Gauge Oil Co., W. H. Bright, of Philadelphia, Vice-President, and Alonzo N. Belford, of this city, Secretary and Treasurer, be held for the murder of 24 victims of the Tioga, on the ground that they wilfully violated the law in shipping explosive oils and in so doing caused the death of the men. The Jury censured the Union Steamship Co.

A Fine Building.

Monrovia, July 21.

The contract for the new Y. M. C. A. building has been let to R. C. Donald for \$24,000. Work will go on at once. The foundation is now in.

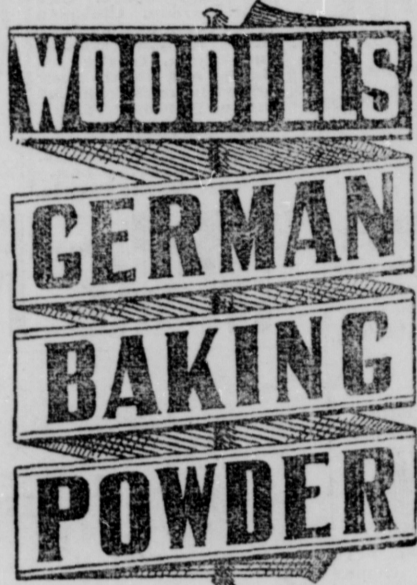
