Choir Suggested For Kensington

KENSINGTON — "Don't let 1963 go by without celebrating the centennial in some way," William Hayward, chairman of the Kensington Area committee told the Kensington Area board of Trade and Industry at a meeting for the members and their wives, Wednesday evening at Sved's restaurant.

The speaker suggested that Kensington is in a position to organize a centennial choir which could travel all over the island and beyond. Other suggestions advanced by Mr. Hayward were a library, a park or playground.

He stressed that something of permanent value should be done with a portion of the funds spent on the celebrations. The great deal could be spent on decorations which would soon be forgotten, while a permanent memorial would be of interest and use for many years to come.

The centennial chairman named a number of committees to work in different departments, and also spoke of special events to be held in the summer of 1964. The Stratford Festival was held in Charlottetown, Sept. 1, 1964 and the island is the first province to celebrate.

Mr. Hayward was introduced by E. C. Moore, and thanked by Lloyd Lockyer.

The president, Edson Rayner, presided and welcomed the members and guests.

William Stewart reported that he had received information that the signal lights for each of the railway crossings are being made available to the town. Archie Johnson noted that a great deal of effort has gone into this project by Mr. Stewart and his committee.

139 Farmers Seek Grain Loss Aid

Up to noon yesterday, 439 growers have indicated to the department of agriculture that they have been unable to harvest 139 acres of grain in the current season, because of weather conditions.

Wednesday, the figure stood at 254 growers with 2,731 acres, and department officials expect that more reports of unharvested grain will come in.

Wednesday, Premier Walter Winterrowd said that the government is considering some type of financial assistance for growers who suffered grain losses.

Details on the amount of compensation, or how it would be determined, have not been announced. Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said, however, that federal participation would be sought.

Agriculture officials estimated this morning that, on the average, one acre of grain is worth about \$35 this year.

Jury Says Rio Not Guilty Of Rape, But Of Assault

SUMMERSIDE — After deliberating for an hour and 10 minutes yesterday afternoon, the Supreme Court petit jury here brought in a verdict of not guilty of rape but guilty of assault in the case against Donald Joseph Noonan and Leonard Joseph Noonan of Borden, and Edison Demerall McKenna of Albany, charged with the rape of Mrs. Norman Allen, Borden, July 22, 1962.

It was not stated when sentence will be handed down. All three were remanded in custody pending sentencing.

Gov't Assistance Available For School Music Program

One All-Star Tilt Slated Next Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Major league baseball players and clubowners agreed Thursday to return to an all-star game next season and it was learned the game would be played at St. Paul-Minneapolis on July 9.

The return to one game, rumored to have been canceled for several years, was sealed when the club owners agreed that in the future each team would receive 50 per cent of all receipts, including radio and television monies, from the game, an increase of 35 per cent.

Commissioner Ford Frick said the owners agreed all but two of the old 60-40 split, the club owners allocated \$100 million to the minor league fund. This fund was abolished earlier this year after a minor league reorganization plan adopted in Rochester.

Frick said that the actual loss to the players would amount to about \$50,000 a year for their pension monies, from the 1962.

The two all-star game schedule has been in effect since 1959.

His hit and triples totals were the best in the loop since 1949 when Sam Jethroe of Montreal collected 267 hits and 113 triples in the official league statistics released Thursday.
