

Skilled Worker Shortage Blamed On Provincial Gov'ts

FREDERICTON (CP) — The present shortage of skilled workers in Canada has resulted from the failure of federal and provincial governments to anticipate the need for educational facilities to train technologists and

technicians, Dr. Arthur Porter of the University of Toronto told the Canadian Education Association Friday.

In a paper on "priorities in the education of skilled manpower" presented at the final session of the CEA's three-day annual convention here, the head of the university's industrial engineering department said it is almost "inconceivable" that the "blue-collar" worker has become associated with a lower form of life than the "white-collar."

Skilled craftsmen "have perhaps contributed more to the biological evolution of society than the creative artist, scientist and engineer," Dr. Porter said. However, "within the next decade or two, it will not be surprising if the prestige symbol of the university BA degree becomes a social boomerang because insufficient bright young men and women have been directed into the educational stream of the applied arts, technology and the crafts."

He said the skills of technicians are of great importance to "the productivity of industry and to the health of the national economy."

The importance of technically-trained personnel has been enhanced, Dr. Porter said, but academic, technical and social education must be more tightly interwoven to permit relationships "unimpeded by social and traditional barriers."

Education is so closely linked to social conditions "that unless we do everything to imitate culturally and economically deprived children, our educational system will never develop in the way we would like."

Dr. Porter also appealed for increased efforts to break down traditional prejudices in certain fields against employment of women in professional or skilled positions. The rightful place in the community of the skilled woman worker must be ensured in the future and women should be expected to enter professions such as engineering.
