**SUMMERSIDE** — A Lunenburg, N.S., rink skipped by Dave Beck won the 3rd annual Maritime Firemen's Curling Bonspiel for the third consecutive year here Saturday evening.

Beck, walloped a Montague foursome skipped by Ralph Beck 9-4 in the final day's match to determine the champion.

Runner up Ralph Beck's Montague rink received the Chase Memorial Trophy. Thane Baglole, skipping a second Summerside rink captured a consolation winner, the Lunenburg Buz Products Trophy.

**Rangers Crush Moncton Hawks**

**MONCTON (CP)** — The New Glasgow Rangers crushed the Moncton Hawks 5-1 here Saturday night before 4,500 fans to take a threatening 2-0 lead in the best of nine Maritime Senior Hockey League final round.

The pennant-winning New Glasgow club grabbed a 2-0 lead before the first period was over with goals by playing-coach Fleming Mackell and Ralph Cameron. Ronnie Gaudet countered with a goal for Moncton 13 seconds before the period ended.

Stew Young scored within the first five minutes of the second period and Mackell set up Daryl McMillan for another at 14:10. Frank McDonald got the only goal of the final period.

**Canada Beats Norway; Russia Tops Germany**

Until the surprising Sweden-Finland tie, the tournament was running true to form. In the first three days the top four countries — Russia, Sweden, Czechoslovakia and Canada — won pretty much as they pleased against the championship pool's lower echelon. There are eight countries in the pool. Now the pressure is on the Swedes, and their tie makes the chances of the Russians, Czechs and Canadians that much better. Sweden, which beat Russia 2-1 in the last world tournament in Stockholm in 1953, and took second place in the final reckoning, must win against the Russians to stay in contention.

Sweden is the only country without a shutout victory to its credit in the championship pool. In fact, the defenses of the top four have been so strong the opposition has been able to score only a dozen goals in 10 games.

**BECAME LEAD GOALIE**

Canadian goalie Ken Broderick, a student at the University of Toronto, became the tournament's leading netminder when he blanked Norway Saturday for his second straight shutout.

Leading the Canadian attack were Bob Forhan of Newmarket, Ont., with two goals and one assist and centre Gary Dineen of Montreal with three assists.

Jan Klapac and Jaroslav Jirik were the pace-setters for Czechoslovakia against the weak U.S. team Saturday, each with three goals.

Finland's gallant performance against the fancied Swedes brought the most feverish scenes since the tournament started Thursday.

A wildly excited sellout crowd of 10,200 roared in support of the Finns, who twice took the lead in the first period and again in the third.

# Canada Beats Norway; Russia Tops Germany

**TAMPERE, FINLAND (CP)** — Finland applied the shocker to unbeaten Sweden Sunday by holding the Olympic silver medalists to a 2-2 tie, leaving Russia in undisputed possession of first place in the world hockey championships.

The Russians crushed East Germany 8-0 in the only other championship pool game Sunday. Three of the four weekend games ended in shutouts. Saturday, Canada scored its second straight shutout of the seven-round tournament 6-0 over Norway while Czechoslovakia blanked the United States 12-0.

With two more games in the third round scheduled for today, Russia took over the top rung with three straight victories and six points. Sweden, with a win and a tie, was in second place with five points while Canada and Czechoslovakia were tied for third place with four points apiece.

The Canadians and Czechs have won two apiece. The Canadians shut out Finland in their opener Friday 4-0 while the Czechs beat East Germany 5-1 Thursday.

Russia found the Finns a bit of trouble Thursday but beat them 8-4. Czechoslovakia's game with Finland is scheduled Wednesday.

The Russians are rated heavy favorites to retain their world title. They meet Sweden Wednesday in the first key game of the 11-day tournament that ends next Sunday.
