Prime Minister Wilson Goes To Parliament Today

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Wilson, shrugging off the weariness of his Moscow trip, goes before Parliament today to announce economic measures designed to fight off devaluation of the pound.

Arriving from the Soviet Union Tuesday, Wilson, 40, plunged immediately into conference with his cabinet colleagues who toiled during the weekend on proposals for bolstering the ailing British economy. Although empty-handed from Moscow, Wilson claimed his trip was useful in the Viet Nam war context.

The prime minister has staked his personal prestige on the policy of keeping the pound strong. He was reported ready to risk ministerial resignations, scrapping popular domestic projects and an end of full employment to force his plan through.

The plan approached final shape at a cabinet meeting Tuesday night, attended by ministers whose pet projects may be slashed. Among measures reported under consideration was a freeze of all wage and price increases for up to a year—for the first time since the ending of wartime controls.

Other proposals included reduction of British force commitments overseas, notably in West Germany and east-of-Suez; cuts in overseas investment and foreign aid; economies in British embassies.

TAXES LIKELY
Domestic proposals included: A cut in central and local government spending; increases in tobacco and drink tax; new curbs on installment buying; a ban on non-essential buildings.

Wilson's squeeze was expected to close hardest on the home front and convince the British people that they must suffer some hardship to extricate their country from debt.

The pound-dollar rate dropped again Tuesday and stock prices showed losses after a brief rally.

Reporting to Parliament Tuesday on talks with Premier Alexei Kosygin, Wilson ruled out any early Soviet-British action to bring closer a Viet Nam peace conference.

Wilson said a deep and thorough understanding has been reached with Kosygin on what must be avoided by both sides to prevent escalation of the war.

Diefenbaker Releases Statement

OTTAWA (CP)—Opposition Leader Diefenbaker called Tuesday for either a royal commission or a full parliamentary examination into the dispute between Defence Minister Hellyer and top service personnel.
In a statement released by his office here, Mr. Diefenbaker said details of the dispute "cannot simply be glossed over by a minister embarked on a course of self-justification."
The disagreement was a deep-seated one and officers who had served Canada well in war and peace "deserve better of this nation than to be driven out."

The "Conservative leader, vacationing in Western Canada, said Rear-Admiral William Landsmore, who was fired by Mr. Hellyer as commander of Maritime Command and of the Atlantic fleet, was being made a scapegoat by Mr. Hellyer, Mr. Diefenbaker said.

"REFLECTS ARROGANCE"
"The ill-advised and intemperate threat of court-martial for one of Canada's top naval officers reflects arrogance and an attempt to silence other dissenters of whom there are many."

The minister's attitude is that of one attempting to take over the role of commander in chief of Canada's armed forces. Such a role is unconstitutional and contrary to our traditions.

Atlantic Fleet Bids Farewell

HALIFAX (CP)—The signal flags on the Royal Canadian Navy's Atlantic Fleet moored in the naval dockyard here spelled out "well done Landsmore" Tuesday as over 5,000 service men, civilian employees and dependents cheered departing Rear-Admiral William Landsmore in an impromptu farewell ceremony followed Monday's announcement that Admiral Landsmore was to be relieved of his position as commander of Maritime Command after his criticism of the federal government's integration program.
Thousands of officers and men dressed in summer khaki and traditional blue lined the dockyard. Above them flew the air force flag of his replacement, Air Commodore Ralph Gordon, atop the Maritime Command building.
Service men and spectators around the building were silent as Admiral Landsmore arrived in his two-starred staff car. Handshakes and salutes followed him into the building where he bade farewell to his headquarters staff.
The hand of HMCS Stadacona struck up and a three-cheer cry arose as the admiral and his wife left for a drive around nearly two miles of dockyard roads and jeties.
Shouted orders brought sailors' hats off and a chorus of hurrahs flew as the car slowly wound its way through the grounds.

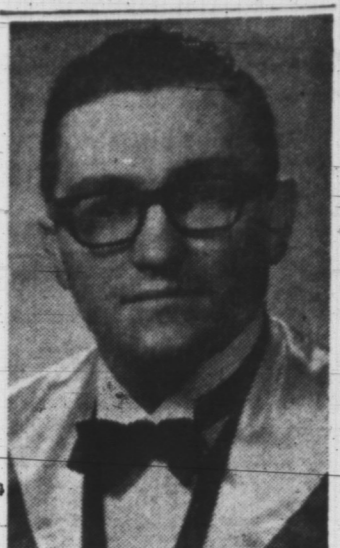
SIGNAL WELL DONE
The cheers were reinforced by ship's horns as the entourage neared the jeties where the battleship flags read "bravo zulu Landsmore." Bravo zulu is naval parlance for "well done."

One flag in a corner of a civilian workshop carried a crudely lettered "Hellyer got to go" message.

Although the turnout was predominantly naval, airmen and soldiers appeared along the route and Wrens from Maritime Command establishments stood alongside the men.

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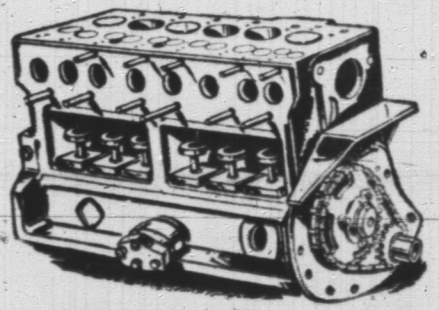
