Montreal Royals Down Cataracts To Take Lead

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Royals unleashed a four-goal offensive in the final period Sunday to grab a 5-3 win from Shawinigan Falls Cataracts in the first game of their best-of-seven Quebec Hockey League final.

A crowd of 7,358 saw the Royals, who finished in second place 14 points behind the Cataracts in regular season play, wipe out a 2-1 second-period deficit on goals by Calum Mackay, Lulu Denis and Kelly Burnett before the final period was seven minutes old.

Mackay also got Royal's first goal at 12:08 of the middle frame after Dick Bouchard and Irwin Grosse of Shawinigan had shot the Cats into a 2-0 lead in the first period.

Jean Paul Lamirande added Shawinigan's third goal at 12:22 of the final period.

Charlie MacDougall, captain of the Bulldogs accepted the S.R. Johnston trophy and Gerald Crews of Milton Hornets accepted silver donated by Patterson's Jewellery. The Bike Shop trophy for the league's highest scorer went to Ralph Frizzell of Milton Hornets and the Fulton Pierce trophy for the player who combined a high degree of ability with clean play went to Forbie Taylor of the Nine Mile Creek. 21 PENALTIES MARK GAME

Maroons Defeat Beavers 6-3 To Square Series

CHATHAM, Ont. (CP) — Alex Viskelis and Chick Chalmers each scored twice Saturday night to lead Chatham Maroons to a 6-3 victory over Saint John Beavers in a rough hockey game marked with 21 penalties.

The victory squared the best-of-seven eastern Canada Allan Cup final: 1-1. The third game will be played here today.

Referees Charlie Deziel and Florett Roy, both of Montreal, had a busy night, especially during the second period when they handed out 11 penalties, including two misconducts and two majors. Saint John was tagged with 11 of the total of 21 sentences, including both misconducts and one major.

TOOK EARLY LEAD
Chatham took a 3-1 lead in the first period and held a 5-3 margin by the end of the second.

Graham Joyce and centre Lou Bendo were the other marksmen for the Maroons. Vernon Jones fired two goals for Saint John with Frank Kuzma getting the other.

Bendo was playing his first game for Chatham since the Maroons received permission from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to bolster their team with two players. A stipulation was that the players must be from the Ontario Hockey Association Senior A League and not the Northern Ontario Hockey Association.

Bendo played all season with Stratford Indians of the OHA Senior A loop. The Maroons had also sought permission to use Lonnie Speck, a member of the NOHA Sudbury Wolves.

SEEKS REPLACEMENT
Murph Chamberlain, Chatham coach, said he is trying to obtain either Jack McKenzie or Joe Schertel of Kitchener - Waterloo Dutchmen as his second replacement.

Chalmers opened the scoring Saturday night at 3:02 of the first period with Saint John playing one man short. Viskelis made it 2-0 at 7:48 with the Maroons themselves short-handed.

Jones put the Beavers on the score sheet at 15:40 but Bendo got it back four seconds before the period ended.

In the second period Chalmers and Viskelis notched their second goals before Kuzma and Jones tallied for Saint John. Jones' goal came with one member of each team in the penalty box.

Joyce got the only goal of the third period at 3:41.

Habs Blank Detroit 3-0

DETROIT (CP)—Big Jean Beliveau scored two goals and Floyd Curry fired the third Sunday night as Montreal Canadiens regained their power punch and swept to a 3-0 shutout over Detroit Red Wings and take a commanding 3-1 lead in the Stanley Cup final.

Puck control through much of the game and particularly in the third period was the big difference between the teams in the fourth game of the best-of-seven final, with the fifth game set for Montreal ice Tuesday night.

Canadiens scored one goal in each period and gave fine support to goalie Jacques Plante who well earned his shutout.

In contrast to Thursday's game when the Red Wings pulled out a 3-1 win, the Detroiters Sunday night were checked more closely and were the first team to show signs of tiring.

In the third period the crowd of 15,140 became apathetic and late in the period even turned to applauding Beliveau as the big Montreal centre came up with some spectacular stick handling.

BREAK STRING
Canadiens' win broke a string of home-ice wins between the teams that started in the 1954 season and had reached 12 straight until Sunday night.

Rough play marked the opening

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period of Sunday night's game and little Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard of Montreal and Norm Ullman of Detroit drew major penalties for fighting.

The two tangled near centre ice, then dropped sticks and began slugging lustily. For a while it looked as if a real donnybrook would break loose.

Early in the opening period Metro Prystai of the Wings suffered a cut eyelid when caught by the stick of defenceman Tom Johnston of Montreal. It appeared to be entirely accidental and no penalty was given. Prystai was taken to a hospital where it was reported there was hemorrhaging of the eye.

THREE STITCHES
In the midst of the scrap between the younger Richard and Ullman and the general milling about, linesman Doug Davies was cut on the chin, necessitating three stitches.

Another blowup threatened after the final siren when Beliveau and Ullman began a jostling match that brought all players from both teams swarming from the bench. Bouchard, veteran Montreal captain who has seen no action in the series, got into the act with Larry Hillman of the Wings and then Dickie Moore of Montreal and Ullman started a third ruckus, but the whole thing finally blew over.
