SEVERE LIGHTNING STORM IN WEST PRINCE YESTERDAY

Drew Defeated In Move To Block Provincial Sales Tax

Reds Retreat In West And Centre, Maintain Heavy Pressure In East

TOKYO, May 23 — (Wednesday) — (AP) — Allied tanks rammed retreating Communists from a strategic city on the Western Korean front late Tuesday while guns and planes pounded a Communist break-through in the East. An armored column captured Changsong, 25 miles northeast of Seoul in the broad Pukhan River valley. Field dispatches reported battalion-sized Red groups were scattered along the west bank of the stream.

Prime Minister Says Measure May Be Dropped

Drew Refers To P.E.I. Election Campaign During Debate.
OTTAWA, May 22 — (CP) — Three parties united in an unusual vote tonight to sustain a ruling by the Commons' Speaker which George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, contended would set a dangerous and undemocratic precedent threatening to throttle House debate on important matters. The vote marked only the second appeal in two years from a ruling made by the popular law-speaker Ross Macdonald of Brantford, Ont. Few Speakers have had their rulings so regularly accepted by the House. Mr. Macdonald ruled out of order a Progressive Conservative motion by E. D. Fulton (PC-Kamloops) opposing further Federal consideration of any plan to get a constitutional amendment to allow the Provinces to impose an indirect sales tax of up to three per cent.

Mr. Drew Forces Vote

Mr. Drew objected and forced a vote. Liberal, C.C.F. and Social Credit members with the exception of Joseph Noseworthy (CCF-York South) supported the Speaker and crushed the appeal 138 to 36. Before the vote, Prime Minister St. Laurent indicated he thinks the plan isn't going to get as far as Parliament anyway because the Provinces don't appear to be able to agree to make a unanimous request that such an amendment be launched. The Prime Minister took the motion "as a want-of-confidence motion affecting the continued rule of his Government and called."

U. N. Troops Have Deadly Flame-Thrower

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA, May 22 — (Reuters) — United Nations troops are burning up the Communists with a deadly new flame-thrower, perfected only a few days before the Chinese opened their last offensive. The weapon is believed to be the ground forces' development of the napalm (jellied gasoline) bomb which the Air Force has used throughout the Korean campaign with so much effect. I watched it in action. An American commander gave the order "fire" and 10 Chinese advancing towards American defences in the Pukhan valley disappeared in a searing mass of flames. The flames roared 200 feet into the air and enveloped 100 square yards. A great cloud of smoke rolled over the area. No sign of the Chinese remained on the devastated patch of ground. Details of the weapon still are secret.

Czechs Protest Hostile Actions By Americans

PRAGUE, May 22 — (CP) — Czechoslovakia today protested to the United States Embassy that "hostile activities" have been carried on by Americans against the Government. It particularly singled out those responsible for broadcasts of Radio Free Europe. The strongly-worded protest also dealt with an alleged frontier violation by "six or seven" armed American soldiers. It said the Czech Government views this "hostile activity very seriously" and that the Government "expects to be informed of the measures the Government of the United States has taken" to remedy the situation. In London, diplomatic observers said it was not clear whether there was any connection between the protest and the arrest of William N. Oatis, Associated Press correspondent in Prague. Oatis was arrested April 23 and charged with activities hostile to Czechoslovakia. He has not been brought to trial. A report from the Columbia Broadcasting System's Vienna correspondent last Friday said Czechoslovakia is prepared to

Iranians Demonstrate Against Britain, U. S.

TEHRAN, May 22 — (AP) — About 30,000 Iranians waving Moslem religious banners, booed the United States and Britain today at a demonstration threatening a holy war if necessary to nationalize oil. The crowd went into a frenzy when the black-bearded, black-turbaned Chams Ghanatabadi, leader of the militant Mujaheddin Islam (Fighters for Islam) said: "All loyal Moslems will throw the British bandits into the Persian Gulf if they do not leave the country." Another speaker, Hossein Makki, said a recent statement by the U.S. State Department, which the Iranians regard as backing the British stand against nationalization, was "a stab in the back of the Iranian nation." Called at an earlier rally, leftists called for the death of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh who has locked himself in his Parliament building chambers since May 14. The leftists engaged Mossadegh supporters who shouted "Long live Mossadegh." Police and army officials were on

Warns Probe Into Gen. MacArthur's Ouster May Incite Russia To War

WASHINGTON, May 22 — (AP) — Gen. Omar Bradley warned today the inquiry into Gen. Douglas MacArthur's ouster may incite Russia to war. He also hinted peace may come to Korea if the Allies smash the big current Communist offensive. He conceded the possibility the war might peter out without a negotiated peace or that the Chinese might agree to peace terms with or without Russia's approval. Bradley gave these mixed views to the Senate armed services and foreign relations committees on the 15th day of hearings into the reasons behind MacArthur's dismissal. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, said of the inquiry: "I think it is very harmful to our security and to our country and to our future security to have to pass on to Russia all of our intentions, all of our thoughts, all of our capabilities..." "I am sorry we have had to do this, but since it is demanded by the people, and is inherent in our form of government, here it is..." Bradley said the present United Nations objective is not to drive the Chinese and North Korean Red armies "clear out of North Korea."

4,468 Enlist In New Brigade

OTTAWA, May 22 — (CP) — A total of 4,468 men have been enlisted for service in Canada's 27th Brigade, the army announced today. The latest figure included 386 enlistments Saturday and yesterday, but the average number of these had been rejected for medical and other reasons. In addition to the 4,468 men actually signed up, the applications of 1,543 others are being processed. Total enlistments to date by army commands: Eastern, 1,193; Quebec, 528; Central, 1,824; Prairie, 275; Western, 651. "Of the 4,000 men enlisted up to May 18, reserve force units supplied 1,224 while 2,785 came from the general public. There were 1,391 veterans enlisted and 2,618 non-veterans. Married recruits totaled 1,360; single 2,649. VICTORIA, B. C., May 22 — (CP) — One hundred geranium plants, a gift to the city by the Ministry of Works, London, England, today adorned a special bed in Victoria's sea-girt Beacon Hill Park. The special plants made the park trip from London in 48 hours and arrived yesterday in good condition.

Pair Fined For Starting Forest Fires

HALIFAX, N. S., May 22 — (CP) — George Cook of Pubnico Head and John Thibault, of Eelbrook, two south shore villagers, were convicted today of causing forest fires by "depositing a burning match in the woods." The men were arrested following a special drive by forestry officials and were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Railways To Increase Express Rates On Fish

OTTAWA, May 22 — (CP) — The railways have been authorized to increase express rates on fish, the Board of Transport Commissioners announced tonight. The board made public a decision in which it lifted a suspension imposed in February, 1949, on increases in the fish rates proposed by the railways. The increases range up to more than 50 per cent and would affect chiefly fresh and frozen fish shipped through the Maritimes and the prairie lakes. The board judgement followed hearings in March at which the increases were protested by the Fisheries Council of Canada, the Mar-

Final Plan For Ottawa Beautification Tabled

OTTAWA, May 22 — (CP) — The final version of a long-range plan to make Ottawa a majestic capital was placed before the Commons today by Prime Minister St. Laurent. The Greber plan to beautify the national capital area was described by Mr. St. Laurent as one embodying a long-time job to be done by the Canadian people. He lauded the main architect, Jacques Greber, French town planner, and the Canadian experts who helped him draft the report during the last few years. Mr. Greber first began planning about 14 years ago. Some of the initial steps have been taken, but the report itself says fulfillment of the entire plan would mean large undertakings extending "far into the future." It would cost many millions of dollars, drastically relocate rail lines and industrial areas, enlarge parks, erect new buildings such as a national library and construct new highways. Mr. St. Laurent noted that the final report is substantially the

Barn Destroyed At Poplar Grove; House Damaged At O'Leary

The first electric storm of the season in Prince County caused the destruction of a barn yesterday and damaged a house. At Poplar Grove, five miles from Tyne Valley, the new barn of Edmund Dawson was burned, with loss estimated at approximately \$4,000, partially covered by insurance. The barn had been built about two years ago. In O'Leary a house owned by Mr. Wilfred Brooks was struck and damaged but was not set on fire. No one was at home at the time. The electric light meter was reported to have been burned out and the chimney damaged. Some damage was caused also to the walls of the building. The storm occurred in the late afternoon and was reported to have been very severe. At Tignish the lightning was not heavy but torrential rain fell. Alberton reported heavy lightning with particularly heavy rain about 6 o'clock. There was no lightning and no rain at Summerside. The Dawson barn at Poplar Grove was set afire about 4.30. Neighbors gathered quickly and helped save 14 pigs and several calves, as well as farm machinery. However, 10 tons of hay, some 600 bushels of seed oats and a quantity of fertilizer, said to be at least five tons, was all destroyed. The Tyne Valley Fire Department responded to a call and helped prevent the fire spreading to other buildings. Mrs. Dawson was reported to have received a shock in the dwelling, apparently at the same time the barn was struck. However, it was not severe enough to cause injuries.

Suggest Design For Canadian Flag

MONTREAL, May 22 — (CP) — Lions Clubs of Ontario and Quebec at their district "A" convention today unanimously approved a design for a Canadian national flag. The flag was designed by Tom J. Henstridge, past president of the St. Lambert, Que., Lions Club. It has a field of 10 bars, five blue and five white, denoting the 10 Provinces, with the United Jack in the upper left and a red maple leaf in the field with a white fleur de lis imposed upon it. In a resolution the convention urged the Government to adopt a flag of distinctive national character and accept the design submitted.
