Accused Remanded 1 Week In Curling Club Break Case

Basil Reginald MacLaine and Wilfred Thomas Hughes elected trial by judge and jury on their break, entry and theft charges when they appeared before Magistrate J. Has-

lam, QC, in city police court yesterday. Both were remanded without bail to August 13 for preliminary hearing. The charges were laid after an incident of break into the Charlottetown Curling Club recently. Allison Gillis is acting for the two accused.

National Youth Orchestra Plays Memorial Theatre Sun.

More than 100 youthful but very talented musicians will make their Charlottetown and St. John's debuts in a concert at about 7:30 p.m. on Sunday, after playing throughout eastern Canada.

The National Youth Orchestra of Canada is the official troupe of the group, which is made up of proven young Canadian musicians ranging in age from 14 to 22. These young people attend two seminars each year where they receive training under the conductorship of two professional conductors, with coaching from seven experienced and symphonist artists.

Formation of the venture came when internationally famous conductor Walter Susskind brought the idea seven years ago from Britain, where the National Youth Orchestra there had already performed successfully. Interest citizens took up the idea and the group was officially chartered in 1959.

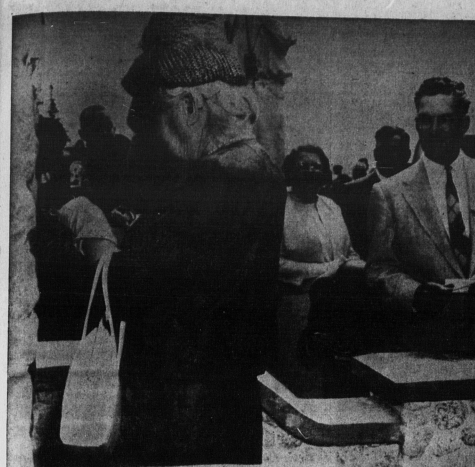

Dame Flora was here on a three-day visit to attend a gathering of the Clan MacLeod on the island.

Clan Piper Donald MacLeod piped the chief and several prominent clan members to the entrance of the castle where the ceremony took place.

She was greeted at the castle by a Scottish lassie who played the "Skye Boat Song" from the balcony.

Master of ceremonies Norman S. MacLeod of Charlottetown introduced Col. Johnston, who welcomed visitors to the castle, and Dame Flora, who expressed her joy at attending the event.

Condition of Injured Reported As Serious

DESABLE — An early morning accident on the Trans-Canada highway near here yesterday resulted in the death of 19-year-old George Albert Murphy, Middleton and the hospitalization of eight persons.

Murphy's car collided with a Michigan-registered vehicle driven by Ernest Crosby, 23, of Churchill, P.E.I., shortly after one a.m.

Crosby and his three passengers are in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Mrs. Corby, sustaining chest injuries, and the car's owner Kenneth Gaudin of Rochester, Mich., with a fractured pelvis and head injuries, were said yesterday to be in serious condition. Mrs. Gaudin has a spinal injury and undetermined chest injuries.

The four passengers in the Murphy car are also hospitalized. Robert Mulligan, 20, Kinross, who suffered leg fractures and undetermined chest injuries, and Allison Green, 21, Albany, after one a.m. in the P.E.I. Hospital.

The Charlottetown detachment of RCMP investigated the accident.

Local Swimmer Sets Good Time

Charlottetown's Morgan Mitchell took the lead in New Brunswick's Grand Lake Marathon Swim Wednesday afternoon by finishing the course with the best time to date, 4 hrs and 22 mins. In doing so he smashed the Marathon swim record by some sixty-eight minutes set by last year's winner.

The six and a half mile fresh water swim is an invitational event run annually from Aug. 1 to Aug. 8. The contestants, ranging from most parts of Canada to the northern United States, may swim the grind any time during this eight day span, with awards being presented to the swimmers with the best times.

Mitchell entered the water at 11:40 a.m. and completed his swim at 4:22 in the afternoon. On closing shores after finishing he was greeted by hundreds of onlookers and Mel MacKenzie, supervisor of the Grand Lake swim.
