## Windsor Bows Out

**WINDSOR** Maple Leafs, one of the strongest teams to come out of the Maritimes in recent years, have been unexpectedly ousted from further play in Allan Cup competition.

The Leafs started off their best-of-five series with Ottawa in impressive fashion and many of the experts were openly predicting that Johnny Wilson's Ottawa aggregation wouldn't win a single contest. However, the capital city crew managed to fight back and make Monday's crucial game a necessity. In the third contest, the Leafs gave up a huge 3-0 edge in the third period but they managed to blow sky high and lose the affair in overtime.

However, even that didn't seem to bother Windsor supporters who saw just their favorites take a 5-2 triumph in the fourth affair last Saturday afternoon. That squandered looked good enough to score the daylight out of Ottawa for Monday night.

However the Wilson-coached crew refused to be awed by the power of the Maritimes' champions and they convincingly trounced them in that final encounter.

NATURALLY Maritimers are disappointed by the Leafs' loss. Had Windsor come through Monday night, all games in the Eastern Canada Allan Cup Finals would have been played in Halifax and the huge Forum undoubtedly would have been packed for these battles with the Ontario Hockey Association champions.

But it wasn't to be. The Leafs lost their magic touch once they encountered Ottawa. It might have been much better for Windsor had they met a bit of the opposition along the way. Their playoff games in Maritime competition didn't give them a chance to work up a sweat and that series with Quebec was nothing but a joke.

## Financial Problems

UNDOUBTEDLY Windsor would have encountered money problems if they advanced further. Although the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association pays travel and hotel accommodation, there is no provision for paying the salaries of players.

Windsor is only a small town and their financial situation must have been anything but rosy when they finished the regular season. If they were to continue against the OHA and then the western champions, money would naturally have to be raised somewhere.

We aren't for a moment suggesting that Windsor didn't want to beat Ottawa but we do say that by losing they missed out on a lot of financial headaches.

## Badly Outclassed

SUMMERDALE Legionnaires took a bad mauling from Montreal in their second appearance in the third round robin affair at Montreal.

After getting drubbed 9-1 by Ottawa Friday night, backers of the Legion boys felt that they would show no much better advantage against the Montreal club. The Montreal boys are the best hockey team as the classic Quebec champions smothered them under a 15-0 avalanche.

Montreal surely looks like the cream of the crop in this series as they blanked Ottawa 4-0 Sunday afternoon. It took some great goaltending by the Ottawa netminder to keep the score down to this figure.

TORONTO (CP)—Larry Jeffrey, 23-year-old Detroit left winger, scored at 7:52 of the first overtime period Tuesday night to give the Red Wings a well-deserved 4-3 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs and square their best-of-seven Stanley Cup final at one game apiece.

The youngsters, playing his second full season in the National Hockey League, broke up the game when he banged the puck past Toronto goalie Johnny Bower for a crowd of 14,017 at Maple Leaf Gardens.

The Wings, who lost a heart-breaking 3-2 decision in the Leafs in the series opener Saturday night when Toronto scored two third-period goals, almost threw this one away after outskating and outshooting the defending cup champions for nearly 30 minutes.

Then, when the Wings let up momentarily, Red Kelly and then Gerry Ehman, a recruit called up from Rochester over the American Hockey League, scored two goals in less than eight minutes to tie the score 3-3. Ehman's tally came with only 43 seconds left in regulation time, when they came out the clock without any more heroes.

Jeffrey's goal, which sent Detroit home on even terms, for the third and fourth of the first period, was followed by his first Stanley Cup goal.

# Monties Threaten For Cup First Time Since 1949

OTTAWA (CP)—To the surprise of most fans and the players themselves—the capital fans itself with a contender for the Allan Cup for the first time since Ottawa Senators took the honors in 1949.

The team was formed last year—with ex-NHL forward Johnny Wilson as coach—when the Ottawa branch of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association wanted a club to oppose a touring Russian team. Monties had little trouble winning in the Eastern Canada semifinals. Monties topped the heavily-favored Nova Scotians 7-4 here Monday night to take the best-of-five series three games to two.

Monties now travel to Woodstock for the first two games of the series—the class of the Ottawa 5-1 Lawrence senior league this season—winning 2-0 in regular games—but nobody looks the top seriously. It was strictly a homebrew league with no salaries and attendance was poor for both regular league and playoff games.

Arrival of the Windsor team for the semi-finals stirred interest but most fans wrote off Ottawa's chances of getting by the Leafs, billed as one of the strongest clubs to come out of the Maritimes in many years. The Windsor club hadn't lost in 14 playoff games when they came to Ottawa.

Heart of the Ottawa club is Bill Watson, 36-year-old veteran centre. An adept puckhandler and a smooth, accurate passer, Watson spearheaded the Ottawa attack in the first four games along with linemate Chester Konecny.

NDG has won both its games while Ottawa has a 1-1 record.

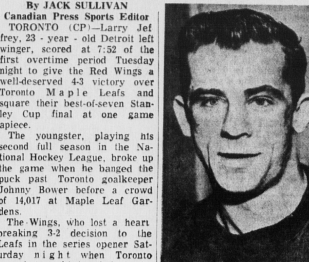
## Ball Tourny Set For S'side

# Athletic Clinic At Athena High

The Track and Field Coaches of the Royal Canadian Legion Sports Training Plan will be conducted at the Athena Regional High School in Summerside from April 24-26 and will be open to men and women coaches and better athletes.

This clinic is in co-operation with the division of physical education, department of education, P.E.I. and the George B. Fearkes, VC branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Recognized as one of the outstanding Track and Field coaches in the world, Mr. Dwyson is a coach of three British Track and Field Olympic teams and for fourteen years chief National Coach to the Amateur Athletic Association of England. Besides his Track and Field prowess he is internationally known as a spawster and lecturer. Assisting him will be Jack Kane, Track and Field Coach, Brompton High School, Charles Ballam, Track and Field Coach, Summerside High School, Alf Gowen, former Canadian Pole Vault record holder, Bob Summards, Canadian Senior Division champion and David Boswell, a former Quebec and Ontario College Track and Field Coach and now Director of Physical Education in Charlottetown.

**CLINIC ACTIVITIES**

This clinic has been designed to illustrate the latest methods in conditioning, training and coaching techniques. Theoretical and practical sessions are also included. The program will be of immense value to education teachers, recreation leaders, Legion personnel and those connected with track and field programs.

There is no course registration fee for those wishing to attend and participants are advised to bring suitable clothes, such as track or running shoes, work on the track and should arrive at the Athena school at 6:45 P.M. Friday, April 24. There is no provision made for transportation.

Accommodation will be available in any of the Summerside hotels and the department of education will pay the cost of two night's lodging (60) and meals on Saturday and Sunday for seven dollars amounting to a sum of \$15.
