N. Y. Stock Market Points Upward

NEW YORK, (AP)—The stock market called a halt last week—at least temporarily—to its February reaction and managed to point upward at the end of the week.

That doesn't mean the reaction is ended. Many Wall Street commentators pointed to signs they interpreted as meaning the reaction could extend further before wearing itself out.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended the week unchanged at \$112.80 with the industrial and utility components showing a slight dip and the railroads displaying modest strength.

At the low point this week, the market had retraced almost exactly one-third of the November-January boom that accompanied the Eisenhower election. That immediately raised the question whether the market now is ready to advance.

The most active stock of the week here was National Theatres up 1-4 at 6, with 81,900 shares traded. It was followed by Packard Motor car off 1-8 at 6.

Canadian stocks closed higher Friday. Canadian Pacific gained 1-8. Dome Mines was ahead 3-8 and International Nickel advanced 1-4. Distillers Seagram added 1-2. Hiram Walker slipped 1-4 and McIntyre lost 1-2.

On the American stock exchange, Royalite Oil was up 1-8; Lake Shore and Giant Yellowknife both were not quoted.

Steel Co. Buys Interest In Erie Mining Co.

CLEVELAND, (AP)—The Steel Company of Canada, Ltd. has purchased a 10-per-cent interest in the Erie Mining Company. Seller of that interest was Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co.

Erie mining is planning a large taconite project on the Metabie range in Minnesota. Manager of Erie is Pickands Mather and Co. of Cleveland.

Pickands Mather in making the announcement Saturday said Interlake Iron Corporation's interest in Erie has been increased to 10 per cent.

Erie now is owned as follows: Interlake and Steel Company of Canada, 10 per cent each; Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co. 35 per cent; Bethlehem Steel Corp. 45 per cent.

Bill To Restore Flogging In Britain Failure

LONDON, (Reuters)—The Government announced Thursday the death blow to an independent bill seeking to restore flogging and beatings as punishment for crimes of violence.

A Home Office official will make it clear when the House of Commons votes on the bill today that, while members will be free to vote according to conscience, the Conservative administration wants the "no-flogging" experiment to be continued a little longer.

Labor members, holding 295 of the 695 seats, are against the bill, since it was their own party which banned flogging in 1948. Enough Conservatives also oppose it to

make its failure almost certain. Conservative Eric Bullus introduced the measure as a private bill, claiming it was the only way to curb a recent wave of thefts, beatings and shootings.

He has raised much support, most notably from British judges. The influential Women's Guild of the Empire distributed pamphlets in the House, supporting Bullus and claiming the "sentimental approach" to crime has resulted in the increase of savage attacks on old and defenceless persons.

Crimes of violence in 1952 numbered 6,516, compared with 2,721 in 1938, the pamphlet said. The government's statement of opposition, to be given by Sir Hugh Lucas Tooth, is connected with its own official bill to broaden laws against the carrying of unlicensed weapons, including blackjacks and brass knuckles. The government view is that its bill will reduce violence, making flogging unnecessary.

Frobisher Ltd. Sells Debentures

TORONTO, (CP)—Frobisher Limited announced today it has sold privately \$5,000,000 worth of four-per-cent 15-year convertible debentures at par. They are convertible into shares at \$7.50 a share if converted before Feb. 15, 1956; at \$20 a share if converted later.

The company has extended to June 27, 1954, the time for exercising warrants to purchase 495,517 shares of the capital stock at \$10 a share.

Ventures Limited has agreed to buy of the 495,517 shares at \$10 for each share not exercised by holders of the purchase warrants. Ventures has been given an option to purchase 500,000 shares of Frobisher stock for a two-year period at \$8 a share.
