Losser Hat Details Light; Traps Damaged

Heavy trap damage was reported yesterday from McCall lobster fishermen, with losses as high as 50 per cent on gear in four to seven fathoms of water, although traps set deeper water escaped damage.

Francis McAdam reported a tangled mess of lobster traps he had in moderately shallow water, with all the trappers gone and rope so badly tangled it was almost impossible to do anything with it. The weather and water are so cold that fishermen are unable to work at repairs.

STILL ROUGH
Fishermen here had planned to haul their gear to deeper water and bring ashore damaged traps that could be repaired, but the water was so rough yesterday morning they could not get out. It was learned that hauls to date have been very light, but fishermen are still optimistic that it conditions will improve, a spokesman said yesterday.

Strangely enough fishermen at North Rustico, a little farther west, did not report any damage from high winds and waves of last week and they were all out yesterday. It was learned from Claude Gaudin, manager of the co-operative.

But catches to date have been poor, with only 30 boats out on Saturday but they brought in less than 6,000 pounds, which represented two days' fishing as the traps had not been hauled on Friday.

Planning Committee For RHS Slated To Meet Wednesday

The planning committee for the regional high school proposed for the Charlottetown area is meeting Wednesday to consider formation of a school board, and to make recommendations to the minister of education for the voting zones for the various districts.

The information was received yesterday from Deputy Minister of Education Malcolm MacKenzie, in whose office the meeting will be held.

Recommendations for the voting zones will depend on the size of the districts involved. For example, Sherwood, because of its size, could be one zone which would have a director or board member, it was explained.

The chairman of the board of trustees is named by the government. The districts within a zone vote on the other members of the board.
