FOR THE FARMERS. WEEDS.

A leading educationist is quoted as declaring that he did not believe one farmer in a dozen could give the generally accepted common names of twenty common weeds. The average agriculturist's botanical knowledge would probably be exhausted when he had recognized and named the Canada thistle, the oxeye daisy and the wild mustard plant, which, with the wild oat, couch grass and rag weed, are at the head of a list of thirty-two plants prepared for the Ontario Department of Agriculture as most commonly abundant in that province. A weed has been epigrammatically defined as a plant out of place. Only some are always condemnable; some are valuable, when not found in ground intended for other uses. The general indictment against them has seven heads. They absorb soil moisture; they use plant food; they shade, crowd and choke useful plants; they increase the labor and expense of cleaning seed; they interfere with the regular rotation of crops; they harbor the spores of injurious fungi, they offend the eye. The loss they cause is difficult to estimate but has been placed by some who have studied the matter at a dollar for every cultivated acre. They are a trouble to the careful as well as to the careless farmer, because their seeds are so easily scattered that one bad farm may distribute them over a countryside. The wind takes some up, like those of the thistle, and wafts them for miles. Some drop into the water, and are carried in brooks and streams to fields far separated from their place of origin. Birds and animals take up others and drop them where they can do most harm. The great distributor, however, is man. His waggons, railway cars, and other vehicles are constantly conveying seeds of various kinds from one place to another. He sends them in seed grain. Samples of clover seed examined showed the presence of weed seeds in the proportion of from 0.04 to 6.07 per cent. Some closely tested samples showed 200 weeds seeds to an ounce, a fact that gives point to the compiler's remark that the cheapest seed is almost invariably the dearest in the end. Much else is told of weeds, and their divisions into annuals, which germinate, bloom, fruit and die in one season; winter annuals, which germinate in the autumn, pass the winter as seedlings and bloom, fruit and die during the following summer; biennials which produce leaves and roots the first year, and flowers and seed the second, and perennials, which last from year to year, blooming and seeding annually. The knowledge of the division to which a weed belongs is often of importance in dealing with it for its eradication, and it is to spread knowledge

of this kind that the department has issued in its pamphlet, prepared by Mr. F. C. Harrison, B. S. A. and which might serve as a textbook for beginners in agricultural botany. In regard to all weeds, whatever their class or habits, however, there is essential to their destruction first of all a determination to end them, and this determination is not found as often as is desirable. Ninety-five per cent. of the answers to a set of queries indicate that the weed laws are not enforced. When determination exists the rest is easy. The first step advised is to remove from fields all piles of stones, which become harboring places for the evil, and, as far as possible, to abolish the "snake" or rail fence, whose corners are nurseries for all sorts of plant nuisances. The plough and the cultivator are the main factors in the rest of the proceedings. Where they are used regularly throughout a season, as a crop of weeds shows itself, the worst infested field may be cleaned, and have much added to its value.

WAS DUE TO EMPEROR.

COUNT WALDERSEE SAYS EMPEROR WILLIAM MADE HIM COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

Field Marshal Count von Waldersee, recently appointed to the command of the German forces in China, and looked upon as likely to be chosen as commander-in-chief of the international forces, said this evening:—"My appointment is due entirely to the initiative of Emperor William. I shall start for China, going probably by way of San Francisco, in a short time. I am fully aware of the great difficulties I shall have to meet in China and of the extreme delicacy of my position there, but I can only say that I shall do my best to prove myself worthy of the honor, and of the confidence placed in me by the Kaiser. Countess von Waldersee will accompany me to the United States."

It is understood that the Kaiser, some weeks ago broached the subject of the chief command to Count von Waldersee, basing his proposal upon the condition that all the others powers should acquiesce in the appointment. The Czar, with whom the count is an especial favorite, immediately consented, France following somewhat reluctantly. The consent of Austria-Hungary, Italy and Great Britain was next received, and that of Japan came last. The German Foreign office said this evening, the consent of the United States and the other powers had been virtually obtained.
