COUNTY COURT.

THE JOY-PALMER CASE.

A large and intelligent audience greeted Judge Alley this morning when he took his place on the County Court bench.

The first decision rendered by him was in favor of the defendant in a case brought by David Carrough against M. P. Hogan, in which His Honor complimented Mr. Blanchard, the defendant's counsel, for the able manner in which he presented his client's case.

The next case was the one of Joy against Hedley V. Palmer, Clerk of the City Court, Peter Bradley and Thomas Taylor, two policemen, and Mr. D. A. Bruce, merchant tailor, the plaintiff in a suit in the City Court. This was the case that "drew the crowd." His Honor read a very lengthy and elaborate decision, reviewing the whole facts, and after applying his view of the law, gave judgment in favor of plaintiff against all the defendants for \$400 damages, being the value as found by the Judge of the goods seized, including ten dollars for the one hour's imprisonment. Ourspace to-day will not permit us to give an extended report of His Honor's decision, which we would like to do, and can only add a summary of the finding.

1. Judge Alley sustains the contention of the plaintiff's counsel that the execution issued by the clerk of the court was absolutely void, and rendered all the parties responsible for the damages.

2. The Judge held (a point which was rendered necessary to decide owing to the line of defence adopted by the defendants) that Mr. Fitzgerald, being Stipendiary Magistrate, was ineligible to be appointed Judge of the City Court.

3. Whether or not the Local Government had the power to appoint him, his right to do so was prohibited by the 143rd section of the City Act, and the minute of Council upon which no commission was ever issued or acted upon was of no avail in the face of the prohibitive words of that section; but His Honor expressed a strong opinion that the appointing power of all judges was vested in the Governor-General of Canada.

There were other questions in the case which rendered it doubtful whether the defendants could (even if above points were decided otherwise) succeed in their defence, but these His Honor said were unnecessary to decide. Regarding Mr. Fitzgerald's position as Judge of the City Court, Judge Alley said that the evidence produced by the defendants' counsel expressly raised the question, and it therefore became his duty as a Judge to decide it. This was required, not only in the interests of the parties to this suit, but in the interests of all parties who have brought actions in the City Court, and who might endeavour to enforce their judgment. These parties, should it be found that the court was not properly constituted, would not only lose their debts but be mulcted in heavy damages for enforcing processes of a court without jurisdiction. Hence the necessity in the interests of all, to decide the points raised by the defence.

Question of the Site.

Sir.—As the hotel scheme is now about maturing into a definite certainty, it is to be hoped it will not be wrecked in a squabble over a site, as was the case with a similar proposal some three years ago. The site for such a building is of vital importance to its future success and should be very carefully considered.

"Fairholm," of course, is a fine property and a first-class hotel on this site would be a pleasant object to look at for the people living in the vicinity or passing up and down the streets. But as the people wish to induce to come to the Island and remain in Charlottetown, and will live in the hotel and have to look out of the windows, we should consider the site altogether from their standpoint. Now, those people will probably be from American or Canadian cities, who are tired of the dust and heat of city surroundings, and who would thoroughly enjoy an outlook over the water, and the suggestive pleasantness of distant hills and fields.

It strikes me that it would be financial madness to place these people in a hotel at Fairholm or any other site in the interior of the town, where they would have dingy, unpainted and monstrously ugly buildings and muddy streets to look at, and dusty air to breathe, and from the upper windows an exposure of black roofs and smoky chimneys before their eyes. Instead of staying in the town, they would all hurry away as soon as possible.

The Douce property commands the most beautiful outlook we have from Charlottetown. The view towards the West River hills in morning, noon or evening, varies with every change of light or movement of atmosphere, and to all strangers is enchanting. The shore immediately below the property is a sandy one, instead of being muddy, as is generally supposed, and at the lowest tide, with a westerly wind, no bad odor is ever experienced. The hotel on this site would be noticed as an attractive feature by all steamers entering the harbor, and the building would be large enough to give character to all the streets surrounding it, and a little expenditure in rading and planting Rochford Square with trees would make a pleasant approach from the business part of the city. Along the Esplanade would be the entrance to it from railway and steamer and from Victoria Park and Brighton along West Street. The air would always be fresh, pure and clear of dust and at a lower temperature than in the centre of the town.

If auxiliary summer hotels are erected at Keppoch and Holland Cove the hotel on this site would be only a few miles distance by steam launch from them. From the hotel to Cardiff's sand beach, where bathing may be indulged in at dead low water, the distance is but one mile and a quarter (only a few minutes in a launch), while both of the hotels on the north shore are three quarters of a mile over sandhills from the bathing beach.

From the hotel on Douce's site, easy access at all times could be had to the mackerel fishing, a form of sport that the Americans are very fond of. A steam launch could make continuous round trips from the hotel wharf to Keppoch, the block house, Rocky Point wharf and North Point, and thus afford the guests many varied rambles in the country and about the shores.
