ing to put all the blame on President de Gaulle when in fact there remained wide disagreement on various important points. But Heath denied this.

Earlier James Callaghan Labour's chief financial spokesman said Ducean said Ducean should seriously consider resigning as Commonwealth relations secretary.

Callaghan, angered by Sandys' speech Monday night, accused him of "never speaking about the Commonwealth as though he really means it."

Callaghan charged that the exclusion of Britain from the Common Market is prompting a flight of British capital to Europe. He said the government must stop the exodus of investment funds by imposing exchange controls if necessary.

He said Prime Minister Macmillan did not seem to have his heart in the new economic plan, outlined Monday in the face of failure at Brussels. He seemed to be "glancing nonchalantly" over his shoulder at a disappearing Europe.

In his response, Heath said Britain will insist on a solid guarantee of good faith from all six partners of the European community before even asking seeking to enter the Common Market.

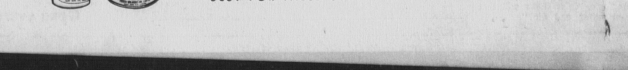
