Gillis And Lewis Predict Victory

A flat party would come out of Charlottetown with a majority for the first time in years was made last night by Queens Liberal candidate Allison Gillis, as he addressed a gathering at Craupaud.

Both Mr. Gillis and his running mate Ira Lewis stated they noted a definite swing in their favor in the city in the campaign compared to reactions last year.

In speaking of criticism of Lester Pearson, Liberal leader, for failure to make definite commitments regarding the proposed causeway, Mr. Gillis told his audience no assurance regarding its building in a building as "no Liberal has seen the feasibility report of which the Conservatives speak and therefore cannot promise to build it on nothing but John Diefenbaker's word that it is possible."

Both speakers made a strong defence of their national leader's actions and recalled the times in which Mr. Pearson is held in all countries. They said this was particularly valuable as an aid to improve foreign trade through having good relations and compared it to Mr. Diefenbaker's "positive genius for antagonizing our friends."

Mr. Lewis said the people of Canada were looking to the Liberals to provide a united government and clean up the mess in Ottawa. He noted dissent in all three other parties and particularly noted that "Conservatism seems to be in

'Not Anti-American' States P.C. Candidate

Speaking at a meeting attended by some 60 persons in the Central Queens Regional High School, Hunter River, and Heath Macquarrie, one of the Progressive Conservative candidates for Queens, last night scored the opposition's suggestion that anti-Americanism is being used in the current election campaign.

Mr. Macquarrie asked "What of us really anti-Americans? We all have relatives and friends in the United States and continual trading and visiting takes place between them and us."

He also rapped the Liberal opposition in the last general election in the manner in which they brought about the necessary and costly election.

Also on the Americanism, he stated that Canadians are not against the Americans but that they are prompt to resist any interference which may be asserted from outside in the conduct of elections in this country.

In reference to the conduct of the candidates in the election, Mr. Macquarrie said "a behaviour of a man in time of adversity is the measure of a man."

In this connection he noted that Mr. Diefenbaker and those within the party who attempted to undermine his authority really showed the true worth of the prime minister to the voters, as has been since evidenced.

Mr. Macquarrie also rapped the use of gimmicks, such as coloring books, carrier pigeons and truth squads, "all of which have backfired" he said, "thus indicating the extent to which the opposition was prepared to go as a means to gain an end."

Mr. MacLean, the second P.C. candidate for the riding, also dealt briefly on the means employed by the opposition to bring about the downfall of the government.
