

Centennial Scrapbook Contest Winners Given

Mrs. Frank Ross, chairman of the Centennial Committee for Children's Events, has announced the results of the Centennial Scrapbook Competition which had over 40 entries.

These scrapbooks were to cover Centennial Events on Prince Edward Island during the period of Jan. 1st, 1864 to Oct. 31, 1864. There were three classes (a) grades 5 and 6, (b) grades 7 and 8, and (c) grades 9 and 10.

The books were judged on a point system under the heading of cover, neatness and arrangement, content, and originality.

Since these were meant to be of lasting value, the material for the next generation, content rated the highest point that was desirable but the books were of durable paper that would bear handling.

Frank Storey of the Centennial Committee, and Claude Wood, school superintendent, judged the entries which were identified by numbers only. Mr. Storey said he was amazed at the "really terrific" job most of the contestants had done on their books, and was impressed with the comprehensive coverage of events, particularly those who placed at the top in the various classes.

Mr. Wood, in commenting on the entries, praised the inclusion of a preface, original essays, table of contents arrangement and the neatness of the choice of a book that would, with reasonable care, last for years.

Both judges congratulated the winners, but said that every entry was deserving of praise. Mrs. Ross said she knew of many other scrapbooks that had been underway in June, but were not entered in the competition.

It is planned to have a special presentation of these awards to fittingly close the competitions conducted throughout the schools in this Centennial year. The award winners are as follows:
