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MARKETS and FINANCE

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—Pearly industrial advances were paired at the close of moderately active trading on the stock market Thursday. Price movements were again mostly fractional. The industrial index average moved up a half-point.

The pulp and paper group was fractionally firmer at the opening but turned narrowly irregular, as were the utilities. Senior oils and steels showed a majority of gains. Beverages moved ahead. Base metals dipped in a major reaction but showed a few strong spots.

Dominion Textile hit a new peak on a fractional advance in brick dealings. Other bright performers included Power Corporation, Canada Iron Foundry, Algoma and Banque Canadienne Nationale. Prominent among the losers were Ford, Weston, Aluminium, Royal Bank and General Dynamics. Gunner Gold was the feature of the mining section.

Industrial volume was \$8,900 shares and mines, 503,200.

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Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP)—A few leading issues declined narrowly in late trading Thursday on the Toronto stock exchange.

Senior base metals were mixed. Some juniors, Bathurst area issues and uranium gained smartly. A few bright spots appeared in western oils.

International Nickel led lower base metals, down 1/4. Eureka added 1/2 to \$1.98. Chromium 20 to \$2.45. Eastern Smelting 20 to \$2.00 and Grandue 30 to \$2.00. Bathurst issues included Bathurst Mining, up 20 to \$1.90, and Maritimes, 24 ahead at \$1.85.

Rayrock led a group of improved uranium with a 40-cent jump to \$1.80. Brantston was off 10 1/2 cents at 64 in briar trading. Golds \$1.05 and Headway climbed 15 to \$1.05 and Patco Consolidated 30 to \$6.90.

Western oil losses were small. On the upside, Sapphire added a sharp 33 cents at \$2.83 and Petrol again hit winning stride with a 20-cent gain at \$2.69.

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Trading attention was concentrated on a few leaders in the stock market Thursday as the general level of prices subsided.

Reports of record high earnings and declarations of the usual higher dividends coming from all sides seemed to meet with selling all around.

Nervous selling pressed down on Bethlehem Steel as traders tried to guess what directors would retrace after the close of the stock market.

New York Central directors declared the usual quarterly dividend of 50 cents and the stock dropped to a low of 44 1/2 before closing at 44 1/2. It was the day's most active issue.

Standard Oil (NJ) reported record high earnings and lost 2 1/2 at 131 1/2. General Motors reported record high earnings and closed up 1 at 134 1/2 after hitting a high of 135 1/2.

The Associated Press average of 90 stocks was off 50 cents at \$16.30, the third straight decline for the average. It was off 1 1/2 Wednesday. The industrial component of the average today was off 90 cents and the railroads were down 40 cents while the utilities advanced 10 cents.

Lower Canadian stocks included International Nickel, off 7/8. Hiram Walker, off 3/4. Canadian Pacific, McIntyre and Distillers Seagram, each down 1/4, and Dome Mines, off 1/2.

On the American stock exchange, Royalite lost 1/4, Lake Shore slipped 1/2, and Giant Yellowknife eased 1-1/2.

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New Brunswick Gov't Brief Most Optimistic

FREDERICTON (CP)—In the most optimistic brief yet presented to the Gordon royal commission, the New Brunswick government said Wednesday this province may be on the threshold of its greatest economic expansion in 100 years.

Although obstacles must be surmounted—the biggest was hydro development—the 158-page government brief said the province had met its greatest opportunity and its people are determined it will not slip from their grasp.

Premier Hugh John Flemming said "If need be, we will fight for our own place in the economic sun."

The brief, which took up all Wednesday's session, presented a far brighter picture than the 17 earlier and generally pessimistic submissions made in the Atlantic provinces. Many of the problems brought out in other Maritime centres were reiterated.

The biggest single problem facing the province was said to be development of hydro to accommodate new industry.

John Patterson, government industrial director, said the general bright outlook for the province was mainly based on new mineral developments and discoveries. The army camp at nearby Gagetown had already spent nearly \$70,000,000 in the area, the pulp and paper industry was going ahead at a steady pace and there was much employment in general construction.

The government brief was supported by the New Brunswick forest development commission and the New Brunswick Federation of Agriculture.

Steel Demand Is Fantastic

NEW YORK (AP)—The demand for steel in the United States is "almost fantastic," says Iron Age, the national trade weekly.

Steel mills are jammed with orders, and "if the mills wanted to open the flood gates they could book orders for most of 1956. As it is, their first-half output is not being booked beyond the first quarter."

Iron Age reports as follows: Producers are wielding the blue pencil in an all-out effort to control the flow of incoming orders, but new business continues to exceed the ability of the mills to produce. It is so even though steel production last week reached a weekly record of 2,300,000 tons and production this week is estimated at 98.5 per cent of capacity.

The booming demand has reached such a point that going mill prices are becoming academic as more and more steel customers are turning to warehouses and steel brokers. The warehouses are turning away some business in order to accommodate their regular customers, and brokers are cleaning up on odd lots that ordinarily would sell at below-market prices.

As a means of cutting down on the immense order backlog, it appears now that the mills will "drop out" one month in the first quarter as a means of cutting down their backlog and catching up with their delivery promises.

This means that they would not accept any orders for delivery for a certain month in the quarter—procedure that has been adopted rarely in the past.

That would help the problem, but not solve it.
