Rotary International Meets In Moncton

MONCTON, N.B., June 8—All the way from Montgomery, Alabama, Algernon Blair is coming to Moncton as the representative of Rotary International at the annual conference of the Thirty-Second Rotary District, comprising the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, which is to be held here Wednesday and Thursday, June 10 and 11.



MR. ALGERNON BLAIR of Montgomery, Alabama

Born in Brooklyn, New York, Mr. Blair removed to the South with his parents when he was but two years of age. His early education was obtained in the public schools of Macon, Georgia, and he was graduated from Gresham High School with first honors.

His technical, architectural and artistic education, acquired through experience, has led to many governmental contracts for the construction of public buildings, Post offices and other federal buildings in Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, and all the southern states record his interest in that particular line of endeavor.

In 1933 Mr. Blair was appointed by Governor Miller as chairman of the Alabama Relief Administration and later as state chairman of the Civil Works Administration. In Montgomery, he is interested in all civic activities, being a member of the Board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce; prominent in the work of the Episcopal Church and a vestryman of the Church of the Ascension; and a director of the First National Bank.

He joined the Rotary Club of Montgomery in 1925 and is a past president of that club. He was elected governor for the 26th district of Rotary International and was a member of both the executive and investment committees. He was appointed a member of the convention committee for 1935-36.



District Governor Percy W. Turner, Mayor of Charlottetown

A figure of equal interest among those who will be taking a prominent place in the conference is the District Governor, Percy W. Turner, of Charlottetown, P.E.I. Mr. Turner is in the wholesale footwear business in Charlottetown. He was born in that city, was educated in the common school and at Prince of Wales College. He is past president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and past secretary of the Associated Boards of Trade of Prince Edward Island. He is now serving on the Charlottetown school board, and is Mayor of Charlottetown.

He became a member of the Rotary Club of Charlottetown in February, 1918, and served as president of that club in 1922-23. He was also club secretary for three years.
