## Capitals Defeat Amherst Ramblers By 6-3 Score

FREDERICTON (CP) — Fredericton Capitals struggled from behind a deficit Thursday night and scored four unanswered goals in the last period, defeating Amherst Ramblers 6-3. The win put the Capitals only one game behind the third place Ramblers. The title Charlotteville and Moncton teams were in a first place tie.

Gerry Smith led the Fredericton sharpshooters with three goals and had one assist. Bill McDonagh and Lucien Gilbert and Nick Nicolle also counted for the winners. Amherst scorers were Dave Kelly, Henry Therrien and Emmett Kennedy.

## Many Eligible For Hambletonia

GOSHEN, N. Y. (AP) — A total of 68 three-year-old trotters, including the highly regarded Scott Frost, have been kept eligible for the 30th Hambletonia, but the value of the Aug. 3 renewal of the silky classic may fall below \$100,000 for the first time since 1952.

Last year, with 87 eligibles as of Jan. 1, the race had a value of \$106,830. And in 1953 the gross value was \$115,000. Depending on how many start, this year's race figures to be worth around \$92,000.

## Toronto Girl Takes Lead In Figure Skating Meet

TORONTO (CP) — Wanda Beasley, a 19-year-old Toronto miss, with 17 years skating experience took the lead in the junior ladies' Canadian Figure Skating championship competition at the end of compulsory school figures Thursday.

The attractive Toronto skating club competitor, on ice skates since she was two years old, moved ahead of Diane Williams, 16, of Calgary, on the last two of the five compulsory figures.

Today, besides the junior free skating, the junior dance preliminary and finals will take place. The senior events go on Saturday. The championships, in Toronto for the first time in eight years, will decide the Canadian team for the world championships, starting in Vienna Feb. 13.

Miss Williams, runner-up in the junior event last year to Joan Shippam, also of Calgary, was a close second after Thursday's school figures, which count 60 per cent in markings for the title. The second part-free skating, which counts 40 per cent, will be held today.

Miss Beasley rolled up 607.3 points in the school figures while Miss Williams had 583.8. Marg Croeland of Calgary 579.1 and Karen Dixon of Calgary 574.9. Marlene Klutner of Galt, Ont., followed with 556.9 points and Claire Nettleton of Ottawa had 551.1.

Glaser, who managed Robinson in his 31-month career as a song and dance man, reminded an interviewer that he was against Jones as an opponent from the start.

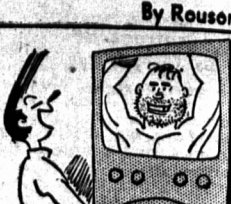

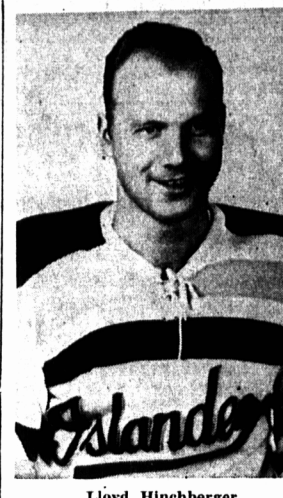

The winners of the third prize were: T. D. Morrison, skip, H. E. Donald, mate, Frank Daley, second, Ensor Bonness, lead.

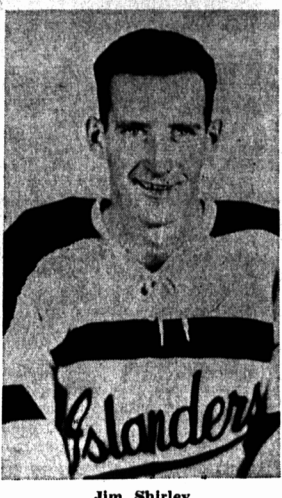
The last two games were skipped by H. E. Gaudet. Frank Cameron played mate position for the final game.
